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Undergraduate Library Internships and Professional Success

Abstract

This poster reports on an assessment completed of former undergraduate library interns to explore the impact their internship had on the development of career goals, acceptance to and preparation for graduate education, and their early career. Through an online survey (n = 45) and six semi-structured telephone interviews, respondents reported a positive impact on the above areas.

Internships at Musselman Library

Established in 1998, the Musselman Library internship program has grown from a single, year-long internship for a recent graduate to several endowed, semester- and summer-long internships for current undergraduates that provide students with a range of internships.

Barbara Holley '54 Internship


One-year, paid internship with benefits for a recent college graduate interested in library and information science to work in all departments.

Robert '44 and Esther Kenyon Fortenbaugh '46 Internship

Semester-long (8 hours per week), paid internship for a current student; opportunity to work in a specific library department, such as Special Collections & Archives, Research & Instruction, Music, and Technical Services, as well as other areas like marketing and exhibits.

Diane Werley Smith '73 Internship in Special Collections Summer-long, paid internship (10 weeks) for a current student to intern in Special Collections.

Research Question

What impact does completing an undergraduate library internship have on:

- Preparation and success in graduate or other advanced training,
- Career and professional goals,
- Early professional employment and success

Online Survey • 29 items

- Skip logic applied
- Open for 3 weeks • Sent to 83 previous interns via
- email and mail Received 45 complete

responses (54.2%)

Method

Interviews

- Conducted 6 semi-structured interviews
- Subjects represented a range of graduation years, current professions, and internship types
- Schedule included 6 questions about overall experience, impact on graduate school and early career, and skills acquired.

Interview Results

Having a Personalized Experience

"I felt like I was a part of the library, and I felt like I was part of the staff."

'[The internship] allowed me to learn a lot of the software, the techniques, and the tools that are used in libraries."

Seeing the Big Picture

"I got to learn so much in each different department and everybody there—the staff, the librarians, were so encouraging in letting me explore and learn new things and try new things."

Being Prepared for Graduate School

- "I really feel like having done the internship I was a lot more prepared for graduate school."
- "Because I got all of [those] different experiences as an undergraduate, I was really able to hone in on what it is I wanted to do as a professional librarian."
- "I already had a really good foundation of knowledge when I started grad school that a lot of my peers didn't have...."

Confirming Career Choice

'I was using the internship to step into the profession [and] it did really help me solidify my decision to [pursue] this career."

"I got to play around in all the different departments and figure out what I wanted to do...that really helped me decide...."

"I was considering going to grad school to get my MLS anyway, and then I took the internship...and that really solidified my desire to be a librarian."

Acquiring Skills

- "The work at the reference desk really helped me to understand how to research things in a systematic and efficient way."
- "A lot of the communication skills I learned from doing reference interviews really help when I'm trying to talk to patrons...."
- "A lot of the little tips and tricks I learned when I was searching for things in reference are helping me search for things at my [current] job, too."

Conclusions and Next Steps

Conclusions

- The length of an internship experience and interning in several areas of a library have a significant impact on interns' outcomes.
- Interns find value in their internship through the experience they receive, the opportunity to explore a career, mentorship, and the initiation into the profession as a colleague.
- Previous interns connect their internship experience with their acceptance to a graduate program and their overall preparedness for LIS graduate coursework.
- Internships positively impact the decision to pursue a career in LIS and helps interns to obtain their first professional position.

- **Next Steps**
- Ensure library internships are designed to support best practices identified by previous interns (being paid, being valued as a colleague, working in multiple areas, tailoring the internship to personal interests and goals, feeling ownership over their work, etc.)
- Share results and connect with campus colleagues who support interns in other areas (Center for Public Service, Civil War Institute, Career Development, and others.)

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
