Reading suggestions

A quick update on <u>Small teaching online</u> by Flower Darby and James M. Lang: A kind colleague (thank you Rud Platt!) generated an abbreviated document containing chapter conclusions and summaries. This document will help you prepare for teaching this fall and serves as an easy access point to the entire text. If you are considering how you transfer face-to-face student engagement into a fall of full or partial remote learning, take a look at these <u>tips on active learning while we are physically distanced</u>. (Google doc; estimated reading time: 8 min)

- Trauma-Informed Approaches in Teaching: Thursday July 30th, 12 1 PM. Join Rebecca (Staff Counselor, Wellness Center) and Kirk Anderson (Assistant Professor, Educational Studies) from Dickinson College for a timely and important discussion of practical ways to incorporate trauma-informed teaching principles and the importance of preventing secondary trauma.
- Exploring Research-Based, Inclusive Curricula for the Online or In-Person Classroom: Thursday August 6th, 11 12:15 PM. From television shows and movies to college classes themselves, students encounter images that often convey a narrow view of who participates in our fields. What are the impacts of these messages on students and what can instructors do in response to this messaging? Numerous studies suggest that course success correlates with the extent to which students see themselves represented in their fields of study. Join Jeff Schinske (Foothill College) and

Monica Cardenas (De Anza College) as they discuss research-based and applied strategies in your attempt to create equitable classes while covering course content.

- Zoom training Tuesday, 28 July, 10 AM. Join Eric Remy for a demonstration of Zoom's features, capabilities, and limitations. If you haven't used Zoom in a while, this may be for you several updates and changes have occurred since the end of the semester.
- Camera/document camera equipped classroom demonstration: This session will cover basic functionality how the classroom camera works, what the document camera can do and the clarity of the sound system. All sessions will be broadcast on Zoom.

- Microsoft Teams demonstration, Monday, 27 July, 11:00AM: Join Eric Remy for an overview of MS Teams functionalities in the context of remote learning. This session will cover the basics of using Teams, such as setting up a team, videoconferencing, chat, file sharing and collaboration.
- No printing needed! Using Office 365 for grading and group work: Tuesday, July 28, 11 AM: Not quite ready to commit to Microsoft Teams, but interested in some of the functionality with documents? This session will cover basic use how to access Office 365, how to share, and how to use comment functions. All sessions will be broadcast on Zoom.
