- **Exploring Research-Based, Inclusive Curricula for the Online or In-Person Classroom: Thursday August 6, 11 – 12:15 PM.** From television shows and movies to college classes themselves, students encounter images that often convey a narrow view of who participates in our fields. What are the impacts of these messages on students and what can instructors do in response to this messaging? Numerous studies suggest that course success correlates with the extent to which

students see themselves represented in their fields of study. Join Jeff Schinske (Foothill College) and Monica Cardenas (De Anza College) as they discuss research-based and applied strategies in your attempt to create equitable classes while covering course content.

- **IT will be running training sessions in various classrooms this week.** These will be 1-1 to prevent issues with COVID: please sign up for a slot on one of the signup sheets below. The technology will be the same in all rooms so if you don't see your room(s) listed you can attend any of them.
- **Microsoft Team training, Tue Aug 4th, 10 AM.** MS Teams is a "groupware" application that includes videoconferencing, chat, discussion boards, file transfer abilities and other features. Teams offers an integrated solution providing features similar to both Zoom and Moodle and thus might be a good choice for some faculty. It is not specifically designed for classes and will not have some of the automatic setup we have for Moodle and Zoom. If you're curious about Teams' features and what you might be able to use it for stop by for a quick demo.
- **Introductory Zoom training, Tue Aug 4th, 1 – 2 PM.** IT staff will provide an introduction to Zoom. This session will cover Zoom settings basics, security and thoughts on using it effectively in classes and meetings.
- **Ensemble Video Training, Tuesday, August 4, 10 AM.** Educational Technology is offering training for those considering using Gettysburg College's Ensemble Video server to host their video recordings in the fall semester.
- **Frustrated with Forums? Wednesday, August 5, 11AM.** Exploring the potential of using discussion forums? Unsure how to make a discussion forum a meaningful experience? Frustrated with student responses? This session will cover why faculty use forums, what appears to work well, and examples of forums your colleagues have used over the last year.
