Hypothes.is (https://web.hypothes.is) is a tool that allows instructors and students to create, annotate, and peer edit shared text. Whether used with the Chrome browser extension, as an integrated part of a website, or from within the Hypothes.is website this tool facilitates shared experiences with text. Information Literacy Grant

The Johnson Information Literacy Grant is designed for faculty members who will (re)design a course to include an emphasis on library-related student research. This program provides the grant recipient with a **\$1,000 stipend** and the opportunity to collaborate deeply with a librarian in order to infuse an entire course with information literacy and research skills.

Research strategies should be integrated with academic content and sequenced throughout the semester to allow students to learn, reinforce, and master these important skills. The grant is limited to courses offered during the spring semester at the 200-300 level. Prior to submission, applicants must discuss projects with a librarian in the Research & Instruction Department at Musselman Library. Applications from all disciplines are encouraged.
