Campus Working Group Grant

Campus Working Group (CWG) grants facilitate small-group collaboration on semester- or year-long pedagogical projects. Often composed of colleagues from across departments/programs, these groups meet regularly to develop material, explore new approaches, brainstorm, offer feedback, share experiences, and/or facilitate cross-disciplinary experiences. Topics are flexible so long as your work connects to the JCCTL's mission of providing opportunities to hone pedagogical skills, exploring collaborative and experiential learning techniques, and/or incorporating technological innovations.

The goal of the CWG grant is, in part, to support this work monetarily, but also to help provide a framework that offers some structure and accountability; CWGs should plan to share their work with their campus colleagues through a JCCTL/JPI event, a resource guide, a workshop, or some other means.

Gettysburg College has received funding from the Mellon Foundation to support professional development for Arts & Humanities faculty. This opportunity recognizes that division 1 faculty have expressed their desire to adapt their teaching, advising, and mentoring in ways that recognize and support difference. Funding is available specifically for humanities faculty to attend teaching conferences focused on inclusive pedagogy. We expect that conference attendance will lead to new pedagogical techniques, intercultural competency, and courses that will attract and retain diverse students.

Funding has previously been used to attend conferences such as the Intercultural Communication Institute, The Teaching Professors Workshops, and the Association of American Colleges & Universities' Diversity, Learning, and Student Success conference.

Grants applications will be reviewed by the Director of the JCCTL and the Vice Provost.
