It's virtually impossible to create assignments where generative AI tools can't be used in some way or another, but are there ways to design assignments to at least partially sidestep some of these issues? Are there slight changes I can make that can have dramatic impact? Join Divonna Stebick, Chris Fee, and Josef Brandauer as they share their own experiences and review options for those who want to stay outside the genAI bubble.

There's still time to participate in the **mid-semester feedback pilot program.** As you may know, the JCCTL and the HHMI Working Group on Inclusive Excellence are sponsoring a pilot program to give instructors access to anonymous, formative student feedback. Only the instructor of record will be able to access this feedback. The mid-semester survey tool is based on our new Student Experience Survey. Copies of our new SES and the mid-semester survey are attached to this message.

What questions does this survey ask?

The survey tool for this pilot program is closely based on the Student Experience Survey which was approved by the Faculty in the 2022-2023 academic year.

When will it be administered?

The tool will be open between 9/18 and 9/29 and administered in class. The electronic submission process is identical to how we administer end-of-semester teaching "evaluations" (which are now called "Student Experience Surveys".)

What is my commitment?

Students are much more likely to complete surveys if we make time for them, so we ask that you take

approximately 10 minutes of class time to administer this survey to your students in your class(es). We will also send out a brief feedback and reflection survey for you to complete anonymously after the end of the semester.

What do I have to do to sign up? Signing up takes less than two minutes and can be done via this link: <u>https://cnav.gettysburg.edu/courses/midsemester_form.cfm</u>

This sounds very helpful. Besides the pedagogical value, what's in it for me?

We will provide a \$50 stipend to instructors who complete the survey as requested above and submit a brief feedback/reflection after the end of the semester.

Will anyone besides me access my students' survey responses?

No. The **data from mid-semester surveys can only be viewed or downloaded by the instructor(s) of record** and will be automatically deleted from our servers at the beginning of the Spring 2024 semester.
