Description

In 1867, President H. L. Baugher appointed Tutor Henry Eyster Jacobs (Class of 62) to chair a student committee to draw up a constitution for an organization through which students could learn about and support Christian missions. March 16, 1867, the Young Men’s Christian Association of Pennsylvania College was formed with Edward S. Breidenbaugh (Class of 1868) as its first president. With an early membership of 40, the association meet monthly, then quickly moved to weekly programs including prayer meetings, bible study, and lectures. Over the years, they supported the work of the Y. M. C.A. of Pennsylvania, several foreign missions, conducted services in the local poorhouse, held public lectures, and worked for temperance. The Y.M.C.A. was the precursor to the Student Christian Association that functioned on this campus until 1965 when it merged with the Chapel Council to become one body.

Chiefly an organization for inquiry concerning missions, the Y. M. C. A. of Pennsylvania College members wrote letters to foreign missionaries requesting details of mission work. Folder 1 contains letters from missionaries in Indian, Japan, Syria, Turkey, and China, as well as a “home missionary” in St. Louis, Missouri. Some respondents wrote of the importance of the work in general and a few wrote details of their personal missionary work.

The rest of the papers contain business correspondence with Executive Committee of the Y.M.C.A. of Pennsylvania and other Y.M.C.A. organizations, as well as letters from local ministers contacted to speak before the group. These records, 1867-1872, are the only extant records of the association until 1946-1965, For those papers, see Record Group 3.4 Office of the Chaplain, Series I: Student Christian Association.

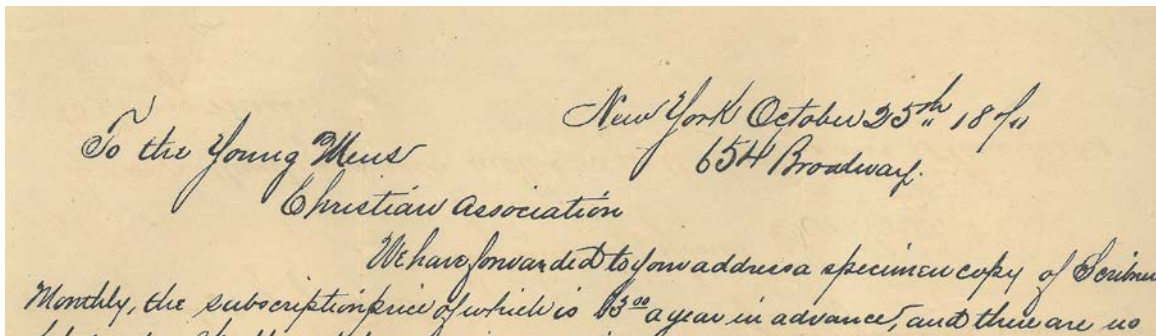

Scope and Content Notes:

In 1867, President H. L. The rest of the papers contain business correspondence with Executive Committee of the Y.M.C.A. of Pennsylvania and other Y.M.C.A. organizations, as well as letters from local ministers contacted to speak before the group.

Rev. John Kistler, Loysvile, Pa., July 16, 1867, to Christian Association of Pennsylvania College. Member of the Class of 1867 and a missionary in Liberia reporting on the state of religion in Africa. ALS, 4 pp.

Rev. Henry Harris Jessup, Beirut, Syria, August 27, 1867, to Franklin R. Feitshans. Presbyterian missionary in Syria writing on the importance of missions. ALS, 4 pp.

Rev. Erias Unangst, Guntur, India, July 22, 1867, to Mr. Charles Stanley Albert. Member of the Class of 1854 and a Lutheran missionary in India writes of lack of missionary spirit in the church and holds the new {Student Christian} Association in high regard. ALS, 8 pp.

Rev. William Frederick Williams, Kharpoor [Harpoor], Eastern Turkey, December 13, 1867, to My Dear Brother. Presbyterian missionary in Lebanon, Syria, and Eastern Turkey writes on the necessary preparation and mindset of the missionary. ALS, 4 pp.

Rev. Elias Riggs, Constantinople, January 15, 1868, to Dear Sir. Presbyterian missionary in Turkey writes of his work with Mohammedans and various Christian sects (Armenians and Bulgarians). ALS, 10 pp.

Rev. Benjamin Schneider, Aintab, Northern Syria, January 15, 1868, to Franklin R. Feitshans, Pennsylvania College, Gettysburg, Pa.. Presbyterian missionary writes of the number of schools, churches and church members in his area and the need for missionaries. ALS, 10 pp.

Rev. Chauncey Goodrich, Peking, March 14, 1868 to Edward Traill Horn. Congregational missionary in China reports on the need for more missionaries.

Rev. John Haskell Shedd, Mt. Seir, Persia, January 30, 1868, to The Christian association of Pennsylvania College. Presbyterian missionary in Oroomiah write of his work among the Assyrians. TLS, 8 pp.

Rev. John Hunter Morrison, Ambala, India to Mr. E. M[ilegible], Sec., Y.M.C.A., Pennsylvania College. Presbyterian missionary writes that much has already by written about mission work, missionary duties, and the need for missionaries, suggests that he has little more to offer and refers him to the many books published on the subject. Rev. Edward D. Cornes, Yedo [Tokyo], Japan, June 20, 1870, to Young Gentlemen of the Y.M.C.A., Pennsylvania College. Presbyterian missionary in and teacher at Kaisei Gakko, Tokyo, writes detailed letter about what Presbyterian missionaries are in Japan and what they are doing currently. ALS, 6 pp.

Rev. William H. Hillis, Gettysburg, Pa., February 12, 1870 to Mr. Samuel Parker. Rev. Hillis, of the Gettysburg Presbyterian Church, agrees to address the Y.M.C.A. at their next meeting. ALS, 1 p.

Rev. James Allen Brown, Gettysburg, March 12, 1870, to M. Samuel Palmer. Brown, Professor of Didactic Theology at the Lutheran Seminary, reports that he cannot address the Association at this time. ALS, 1 p.

Henry S. Meyers, York, Pa., May 3, 1870, to Mr. Samuel Palmer. Meyers, a member of the State Y.M.C.A. Committee for the International Convention to be held in Indianapolis, recommends sending delegates and asks for a report on the Association. ALS, 2 pp.

Rev. Joel Swartz, [St. James Lutheran] Carlisle, Pa., June 20, 1870, to Francis H. Weaver. Swartz states that he is coming to town on the 25th to address the Y.M.C.A. ALS, 1 p.

James Strathmore, Philadelphia, Pa., October 8, 1870, to President of Y.M.C.A. Strathmore puts forth the name of s. M. Godfrey as a lecturer and dramatic reader. ALS, 2 pp.

Scribner & Co., New York, New York, October 25, 1870, to the Young Men's Christian Association. Sending a copy of Scriber's Monthly and soliciting a subscription. L, 1 p.

Charles Albert Wiley, Ithaca, New York, November 14, 1870, to the Sec., Committee of Lecture Course. Wiley sends his flyer and mentions that he is at liberty to accept engagements. ALS, 1 p.

Thomas K. Cree, Chairman, State Executive Committee, Pittsburgh Pa., to President, Gettysburg Y. M. C. A. Requesting support for their general State work by subscribing to a report of the Convention, "Our Work and How It Is Done." ALS, 2 pp.

Cephas Brainerd, Executive Committee of the Y.M.C.A. of United States and British Provinces, New York, December 23, 1870. Appeal for special cooperation for extension of subscription list – need more subscribers. ALS, 1 pp.

W. M. Howell, West Virginia University, Morgantown, West Virginia, October 16, 1871, to Secretary of Y. M. C. A., Penna. College. About to organize a Young Men's Christian Association at their college and request suggestions that will help them. ALS, 1 p.
