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# Analyzing the Response to COVID-19 in Pennsylvania State Correctional Institutions

## Abstract

To evaluate the effects of the COVID-19 outbreak on the Pennsylvania prison system, I collected data from the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections, the Pennsylvania Department of Health, and the Marshall Project. I supplemented the data with opinion pieces and journal articles discussing the specific issues that this pandemic imposes upon prisons in the United States. In sum, population data collected from the Department of Corrections showed that only a few State Correctional Institutions saw a steady decrease in population over the 25 day study period from June 18th through July 13th (Pennsylvania Department of Corrections, 2020). Combining testing data collected in part from the DOC and in part from the Department of Health, I compared testing rates of surrounding communities (Pennsylvania Department of Health, 2020 & PA DOC, 2020). The Marshall Project data demonstrates that testing rates are higher and COVID-19 diagnosis rates are lower among incarcerated persons than among the general population (The Marshall Project, 2020). However, this finding did not hold true for correctional staff, who had a higher rate of diagnosis coupled with a lower testing rate compared to all of Pennsylvania (The Marshall Project, 2020).

## Background

At the start of 2020 the novel coronavirus, known as COVID-19, began to emerge, first on January 4<sup>th</sup>, 2020 when the World Health Organization reported a group of pneumonia cases in Wuhan, China (WHO, 2020). This virus began to spread, and on January 21<sup>st</sup>, 2020, the first reported case of COVID-19 appeared in the United States in Washington State (Wolf, 2020, B). In response, the Pennsylvania Department of Health (DOH) activated the Department of

Operations Center through the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA), in early February, to begin preparing for a potential outbreak (Wolf, 2020, B). As the spread of COVID-19 continued through early March, PEMA brought to force the Commonwealth Response Coordination Center to aid the PA DOH (Wolf, 2020, B).

On March 6<sup>th</sup>, the first two cases of COVID-19 were diagnosed in Pennsylvania, prompting Governor Tom Wolf to make a Disaster Declaration (Wolf, 2020, B). March 12<sup>th</sup>, 2020, saw the first closing of schools and adult day centers, with a request that non-essential businesses also close (WOLF, 2020, B). Limitations were set on visitation in nursing homes and correctional facilities for fourteen days in response to increased cases in Montgomery County (Wolf, 2020, B). As the virus continued to spread through Pennsylvania, the Commonwealth undertook other preventative measures, such as closing schools statewide for ten days (Wolf, 2020, B). Then, on March 18<sup>th</sup> the first death in Pennsylvania from COVID-19 occurred (Wolf, 2020, B). In rapid response, all non-essential businesses in Pennsylvania were closed on March 19<sup>th</sup> (Wolf, 2020, B). Shortly after, stay-at-home orders began to be implemented at the county level beginning March 23<sup>rd</sup>, until it was declared a statewide mandate on April 1<sup>st</sup> (Wolf, 2020, B). As of April 9<sup>th</sup>, all Pennsylvania schools closed through the academic year. Governor Wolf, on April 10<sup>th</sup>, released his Temporary Program to Reprieve Sentences of Incarceration, a program to allow for the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections to transfer inmates to other facilities due to the pandemic (Wolf, 2020, A). The temporary reprieve, a copy of which is attached as Appendix A, allows SCIs to transfer eligible inmates to other facilities in an effort to lower overall populations in support of mitigating the spread of COVID-19 (Wolf, 2020, A).

## Concerns

As the threat of the COVID-19 pandemic began, many worried about the impact in prisons around the world affecting over eleven million incarcerated individuals and all those who work in correctional facilities (Burki, 2020). In the United States alone, 2.2 million people are incarcerated (Burki, 2020), additionally, as of May 2019 and estimated 423,050 people are employed as correctional officers in the United States (U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2019). The close living quarters and often overcrowding of many prisons create ideal conditions for rapid spread of the virus, with 124 prisons in the world exceeding their capacity (Burki, 2020). In the United States, a Department of Justice report found that between 12% and 19% of prisons operate above capacity (Orell, 2020, A). In addition to concerns about overcrowding, many staff members enter and exit correctional institutions each day. Additionally, transfer of inmates within and between facilities makes it difficult to stop spread between facilities as well as between the facilities and their surrounding communities.

Illustratively, Bethany Young, an Urban Institute policy associate, spoke of her worries of lack of adequate cleaning supplies and personal protective equipment (PPE) available to inmates in an interview hosted by Justin Milner (Milner, 2020). Young also addressed her concerns over the mental health effects of long term quarantine conditions on inmates (Milner, 2020). Another expert, David Patton, Executive Director and Attorney-in-Chief of the Federal Defenders of New York, explained his concerns about inmates receiving medical care simply due to the costs of transportation to medical facilities (Burki, 2020). He also questioned whether inmates will admit to being sick due to fears of being placed in solitary confinement for isolation (Burki, 2020). Concerns like these and others have led to many proposals of how to react to the pandemic within correctional settings.

## Proposed Responses

Many individuals and organizations have proposed temporary early releases of eligible prisoners to lower populations within facilities (Burki, 2020; Orell, 2020, B; Simpson, 2020). Brent Orell of the American Enterprise Institute believes that reprieves should be put in place to alleviate some of the burden on the prison system (Orell, 2020, B). He focuses on early release of inmates who are at higher risk due to age or underlying health conditions, who are also at a low risk for re-offense. He relies upon evidence that prisoners aged 50-65 have a re-arrest rate of 2% and that those over 65 years have a re-arrest rate of close to 0% (Orell, 2020, B). Orell is not alone in his call for reprieves. In an article published by *The Lancet*, Frederick Altice from the Yale School of Medicine argued for moving many prisoners out of prisons into other facilities with lower population density (Burki, 2020). In the same *Lancet* article, Michelle Bachelet, the United Nations Commissioner for Human Rights also supports early release of elderly incarcerated populations in light of their higher risk for COVID-19 and low risk of re-offense (Burki, 2020). Simpson (2020) specifically calls for release of inmates who have a high vulnerability to COVID-19 due to chronic conditions such as intravenous drug use, along with similar parameters of examining risk to the community.

## Pennsylvania Department of Corrections Initial Response

As the pandemic began to spread in the United States, the PA DOC began screening all staff for symptoms and suspended all in-person visitation on March 12<sup>th</sup> (Wolf, 2020, B). Starting on March 28<sup>th</sup>, all new inmates were quarantined at SCI Retreat before transfer to their assigned facilities (Wolf, 2020, B). With growing concerns over a potential outbreak, on March 29<sup>th</sup> at 10pm, a statewide quarantine began for all inmates, meaning that all inmates would

remain in their cells, including at meal times, unless they had a video visit, phone call, or needed to use the law library (Wolf, 2020, B). Additionally, Governor Tom Wolf announced the temporary reprieve policy on April 10<sup>th</sup>, 2020, pursuant to those inmates who are at a low risk to the community and have a high risk due to chronic disease to allow them to become eligible for transfer out of high-density prisons, as described more fully below (Wolf, 2020, B).

### Temporary Reprieve Policy

In an effort to reduce the overall population of state correctional facilities, Governor Wolf on April 10<sup>th</sup> released his Temporary Reprieve policy to allow for the release for certain inmates (Wolf, 2020, A). The reprieve allowed approved inmates to be transferred from the state facility to either a Community Corrections Center, a Community Corrections Facility, or home confinement (Wolf, 2020, A). He stated in his reprieve policy:

The Pennsylvania Department of Corrections shall establish a Reprieve Sentence of Incarceration Programs as the Department of Corrections deems necessary to transfer to Community Corrections Centers, Community Corrections Facilities, or home confinement vulnerable individuals who would otherwise be eligible for release within the next twelve (12) months; or any inmate within nine (9) months of their minimum eligibility release date.

This temporary reprieve targets inmates who are at a higher risk for complications if they contract COVID-19 with a focus on age, autoimmune diseases, pregnancy, or other chronic conditions (Wolf, 2020, A). Governor Wolf's policy prohibits release of inmates who have committed certain violent crimes, out of a concern for public safety (Wolf, 2020, A). The full reprieve policy is available for review in Appendix A.



## Demobilization Plan

The demobilization plan being used by the PA DOC outlines restrictions on varying activities to be taken at different steps through the reopening of SCIs and was announced on May 22<sup>nd</sup> (PA DOC, 2020). The plan consists of five color-coded levels of restriction. Levels 5 and 4 are the most restrictive at red, moderate Level 3 is represented by yellow, and Levels 2 and 1 are the least restrictive at green (PA DOC, 2020). Each level corresponds to restrictions in place on thirteen topics including: cohort size, work detail, treatment and educational services, meals, medical services and medication, law and leisure library services, commissary, barber shop and cosmetology services, gymnasium, activities, visiting, religious activities and unit activity (PA DOC, 2020). This plan addresses COVID-19 concerns by outlining specific restrictions and how these will change as mitigation efforts are deemed effective and SCIs are able to gradually reopen. ## The Marshall Project Data: COVID-19 Prevalence

The Marshall Project, in collaboration with the Associated Press, has collected weekly COVID-19 data for state and federal prisons since March 26<sup>th</sup>, 2020 (The Marshall Project, 2020). For Pennsylvania; data, testing and case data for those on parole are not included, and nationally juvenile facilities are not discussed (The Marshall Project, 2020). The Marshall Project also provides comparisons among cases, deaths, and testing rates by state for the prison system and the general data. This general data for the states is collected from The COVID Tracking Project and the US Census Bureau (The Marshall Project, 2020). The Marshall Project's data presented in this paper is current through July 30, 2020.

Pennsylvania has a total number of cases of 304 in prisons, or 73 per 10,000 inmates, standing at the 33<sup>rd</sup> highest in total cases, based on a testing rate of 1,916 per 10,000 prisoners (The Marshall Project, 2020). However, Pennsylvania ranked 17<sup>th</sup> for the highest number of deaths at 10 total, or 2 per 10,000 inmates (The Marshall Project, 2020). The Marshall Project (2020) found that the total number of cases was 15% lower, death rates were 57% lower, and testing rates were 110% higher in Pennsylvania prisons compared to the state overall. In other words, Pennsylvania prisons are more successfully mitigating the spread of COVID-19 in conjunction with higher testing rates, however the death rates continue to be higher in Pennsylvania compared to other state's prison populations.

The Marshall Project (2020) also reported data on cases, deaths and testing for correctional facility staff within the Pennsylvania prison system. The Marshall Project (2020) found that there had been 216 cases, or 143 per 10,000 staff members and 1 death, or 0.7 per 10,000 staff members. These rates are based on a testing rate of 749 per 10,000 staff members (The Marshall Project, 2020). Compared to Pennsylvania's general population, SCI staff members' cases are 68% higher, deaths are 88% lower, and testing is 18% lower for staff (The Marshall Project, 2020).

## Methods

### Section I: Population Over Time for Individual State Correctional Institutions

All population data was collected over a 25 day time period from June 18<sup>th</sup> through July 13<sup>th</sup> for each State Correctional Institution in Pennsylvania. Individual data points were collected for June 18<sup>th</sup>, June 22<sup>nd</sup>, June 23<sup>rd</sup>, June 24<sup>th</sup>, June 25<sup>th</sup>, June 29<sup>th</sup>, June 30<sup>th</sup>, July 1<sup>st</sup>, July 2<sup>nd</sup>, July 6<sup>th</sup>, July 7<sup>th</sup>, July 8<sup>th</sup>, July 10<sup>th</sup>, July 13<sup>th</sup>. The data are directly taken from the Pennsylvania

Department of Corrections coronavirus page (PA DOC, 2020). The general current day population is presented in this paper for each SCI. The Retreat State Correctional Institution was closed due to pre-pandemic planning by July 1<sup>st</sup>, explaining the uncharacteristic rapid decrease in population (Learn-Andes, 2020). Each SCI followed a different trajectory of increasing or decreasing population. The four most distinct will be presented in this section, with the entire set of data available in Appendix B. Fayette represents the SCI with the greatest increase in population, Laurel Highlands shows the most distinct decrease in population, Phoenix displays the most drastic change and Quehanna is the SCI with the least population change.

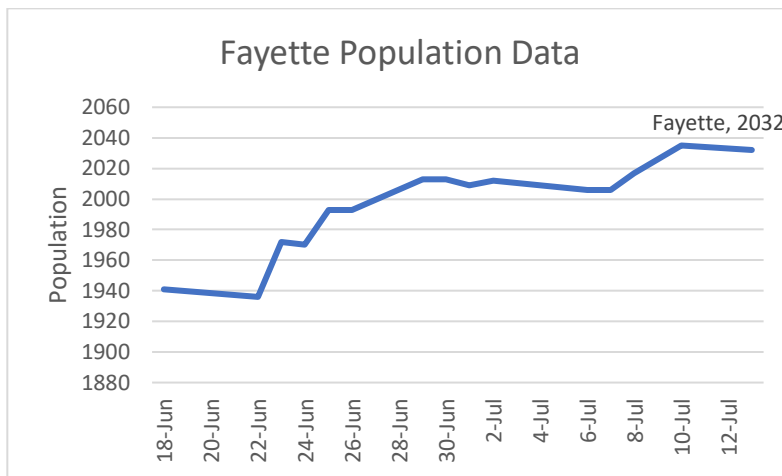


Figure 2: Fayette Population Data. Data specific to Fayette State Correctional Institution. Collected from the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections.

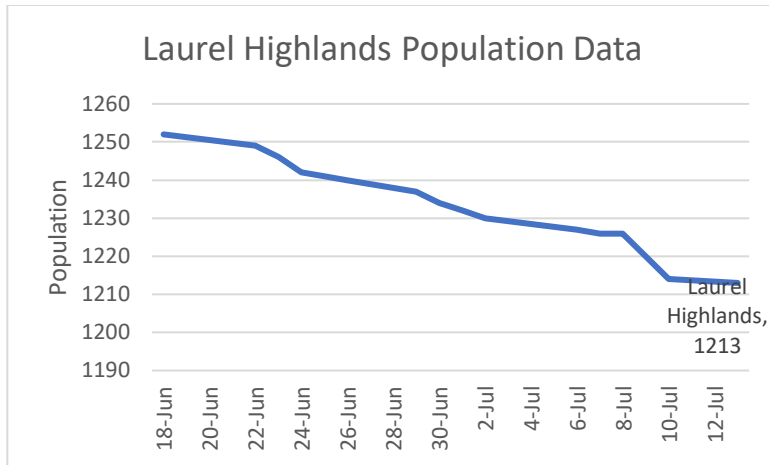


Figure 3: Laurel Highlands Population Data. Data specific to Laurel Highlands State Correctional Institution. Collected from the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections coronavirus webpage over the 25 day window on June 18<sup>th</sup> through July 13<sup>th</sup>, with 15 individual data points.

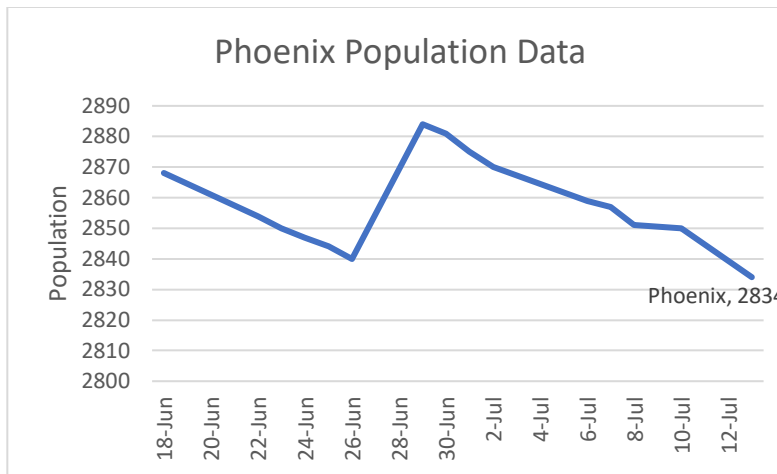


Figure 4: Phoenix Population Data. Data specific to Phoenix State Correctional Institution. Collected from the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections coronavirus webpage over the 25 day window on June 18<sup>th</sup> through July 13<sup>th</sup>, with 15 individual data points.

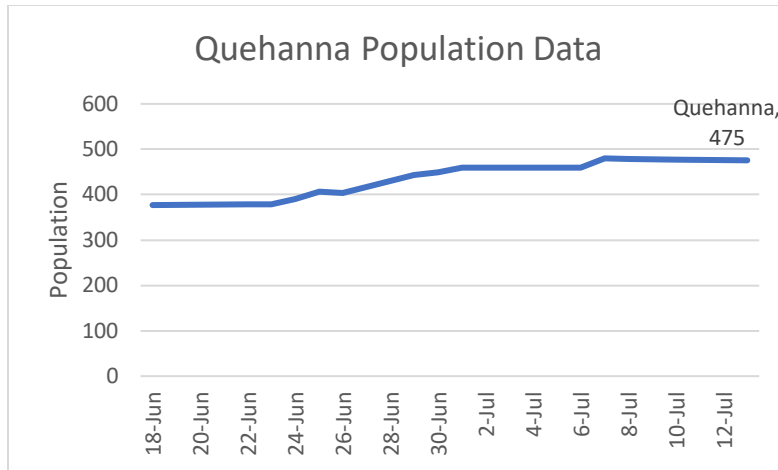


Figure 5: Quehanna Population Data.

## Section II: Testing Rates for State Correctional Institutions

Testing data were collected over a 25 day period from June 18<sup>th</sup> through July 13<sup>th</sup> for each State Correctional Institution in Pennsylvania. Individual data points were collected for June 18<sup>th</sup>, June 22<sup>nd</sup>, June 23<sup>rd</sup>, June 24<sup>th</sup>, June 25<sup>th</sup>, June 29<sup>th</sup>, June 30<sup>th</sup>, July 1<sup>st</sup>, July 2<sup>nd</sup>, July 6<sup>th</sup>, July 7<sup>th</sup>, July 8<sup>th</sup>, July 10<sup>th</sup>, July 13<sup>th</sup>. The data for the SCI comes from the PA DOC's coronavirus webpage (PA DOC, 2020). Staff and inmate testing were reported separately per SCI. County level data were obtained from the Pennsylvania Department of Health coronavirus site and are organized by region. Specific regions are Northwest, Northcentral, Northeast, Southwest, Southcentral and Southeast. The probable/pending section represents two possible types of data. Probable represents county data and pending represents SCI data for tests that have not yet received results. Data presented here show comparison of testing rates within the four SCI's highlighted above; Fayette, Laurel Highlands, Phoenix and Quehanna. Fayette, Laurel Highlands, and Quehanna all display a slight increase in the amount of negative cases on each date. Phoenix had a much higher positive population in comparison to the other SCIs, which stayed relatively constant as the negative population increased. Each SCI is shown on three

separate charts displaying data from June 18<sup>th</sup>, June 30<sup>th</sup>, and July 13<sup>th</sup>. A complete list of charts is available in Appendix C. Raw data is available in Appendix D.

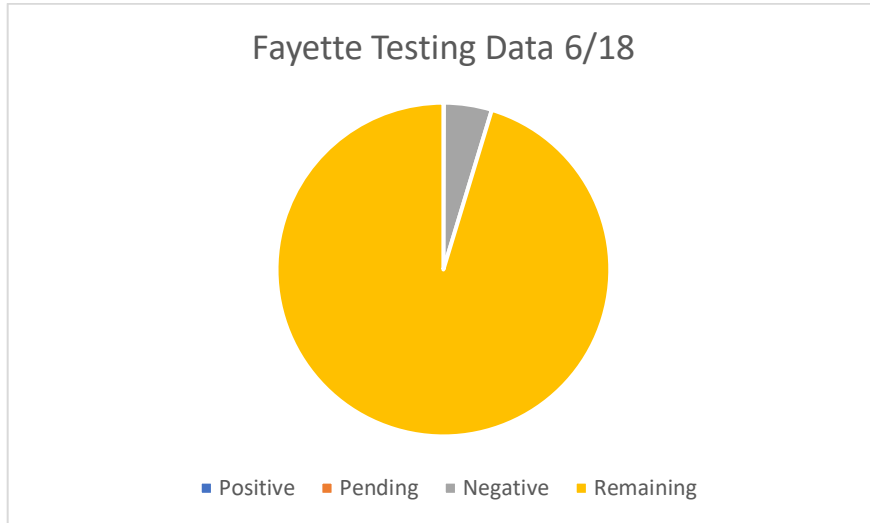


Figure 6: Fayette Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 1, Pending: 0, Negative: 90, Remaining: 1850.

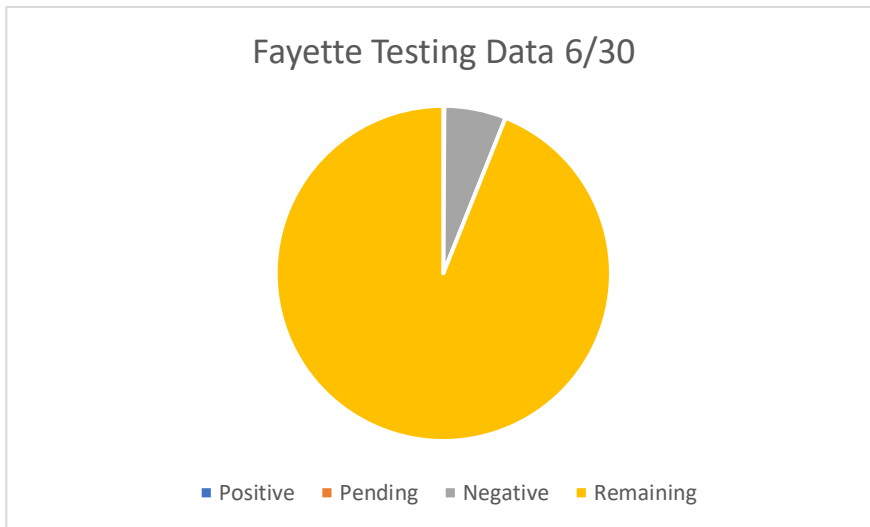


Figure 7: Fayette Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 1, Pending: 1, Negative: 120, Remaining 1891.

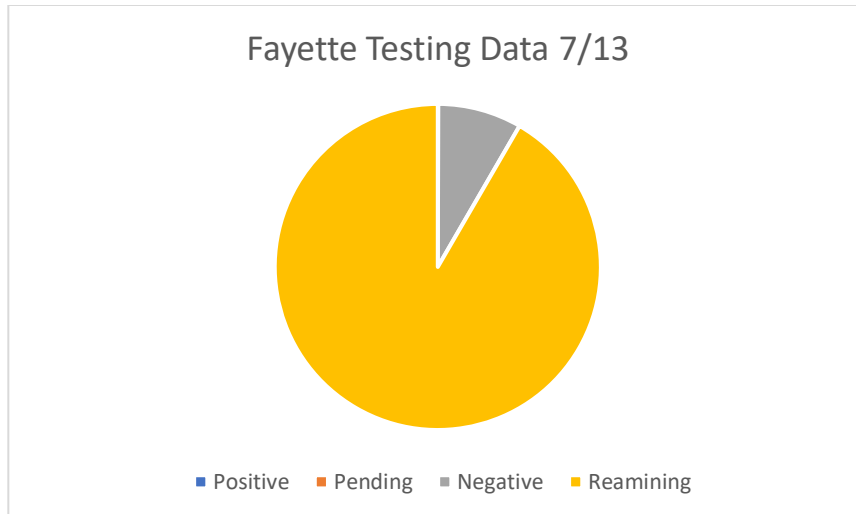


Figure 8: Fayette Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 1, Pending: 0, Negative: 169, Remaining: 1862.

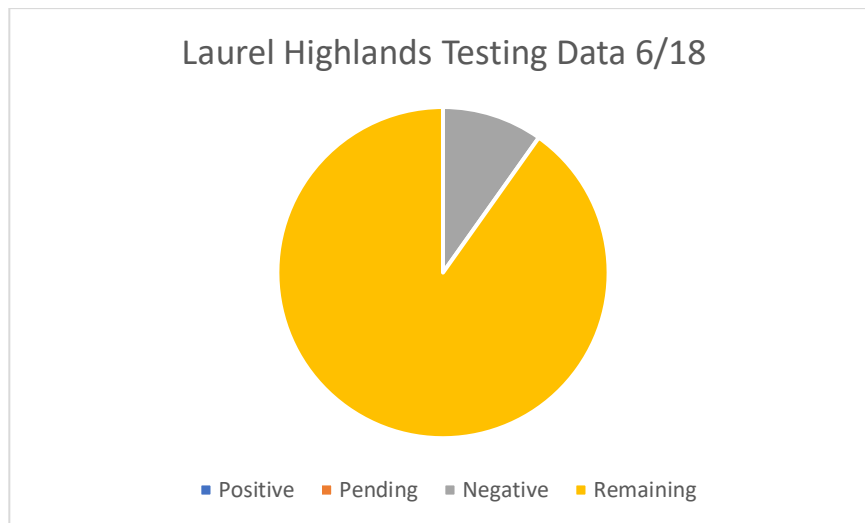


Figure 9: Laurel Highlands Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 123, Remaining: 1129.

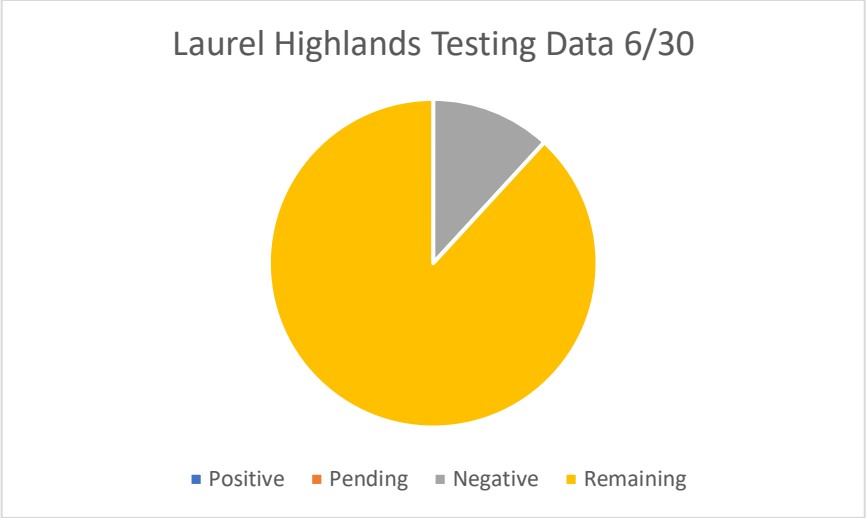


Figure 10: Laurel Highlands Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 146, Remaining: 1088.

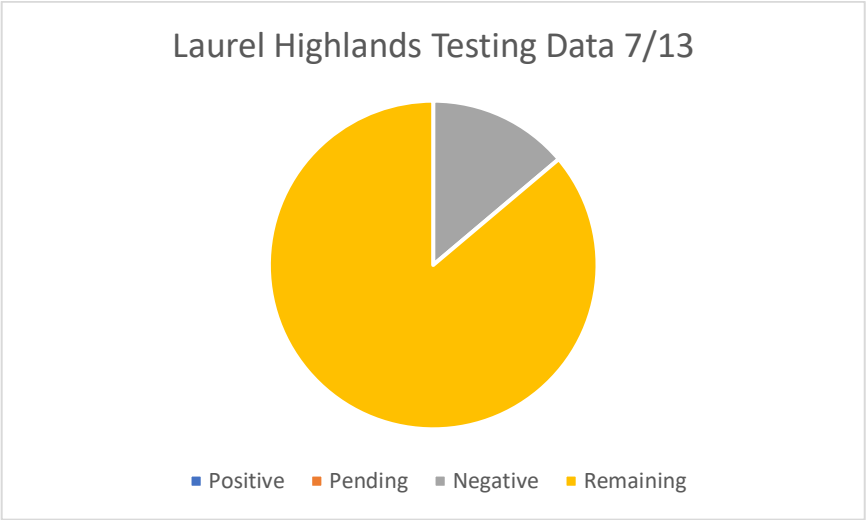


Figure 11: Laurel Highlands Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 168, Remaining: 1045.



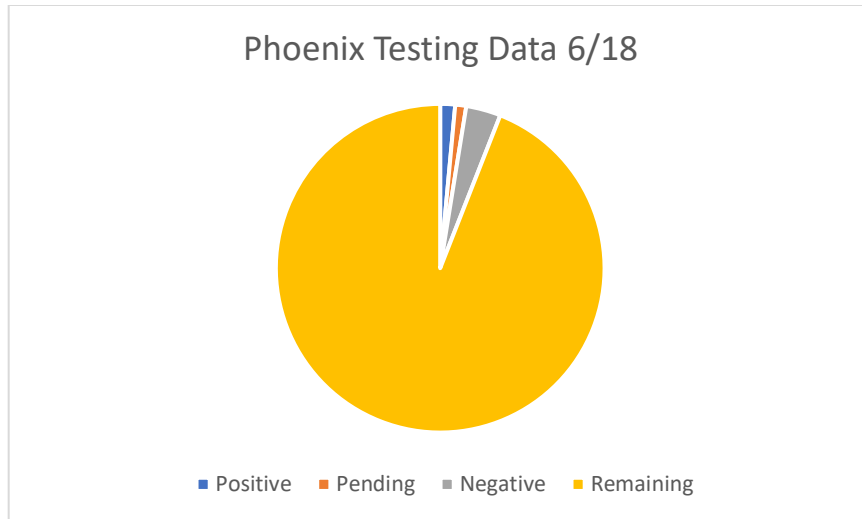


Figure 12: Phoenix Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 42, Pending: 31, Negative: 98, Remaining: 2697.

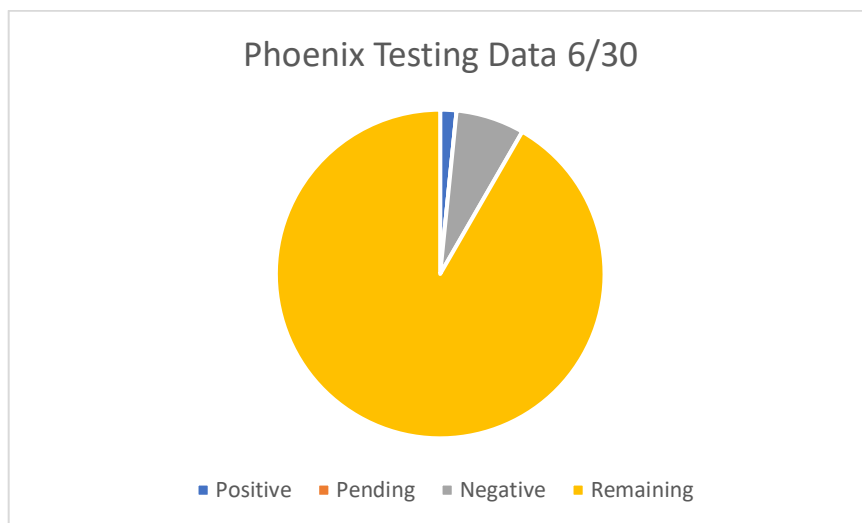


Figure 13: Phoenix Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 46, Pending: 0, Negative: 194, Remaining: 2641.

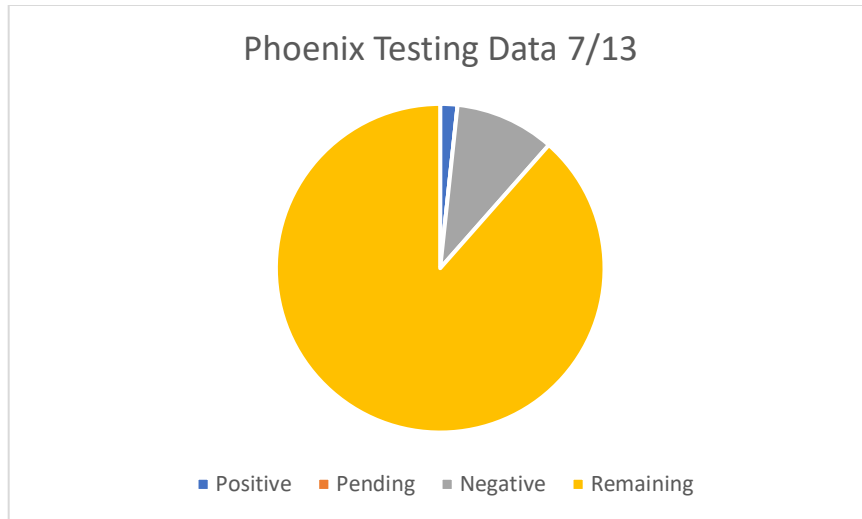


Figure 14: Phoenix Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 48, Pending: 0, Negative: 278, Remaining: 2508.

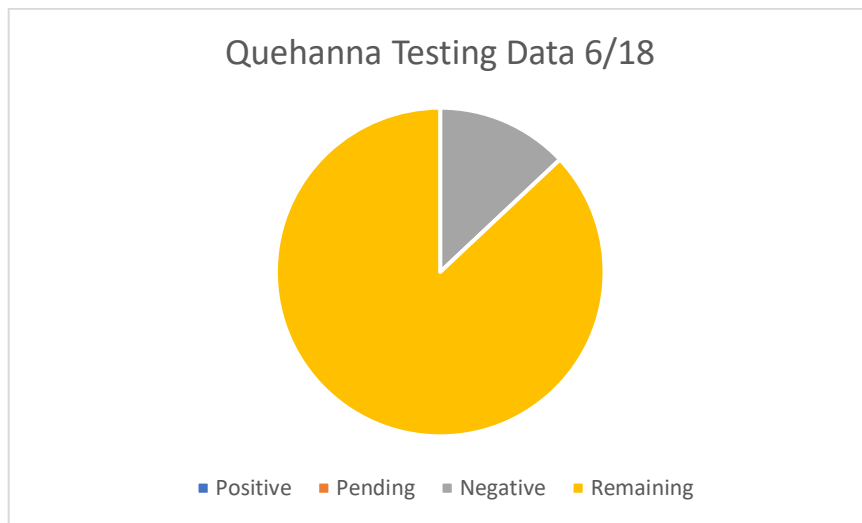


Figure 15: Quehanna Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 49, Remaining: 328.

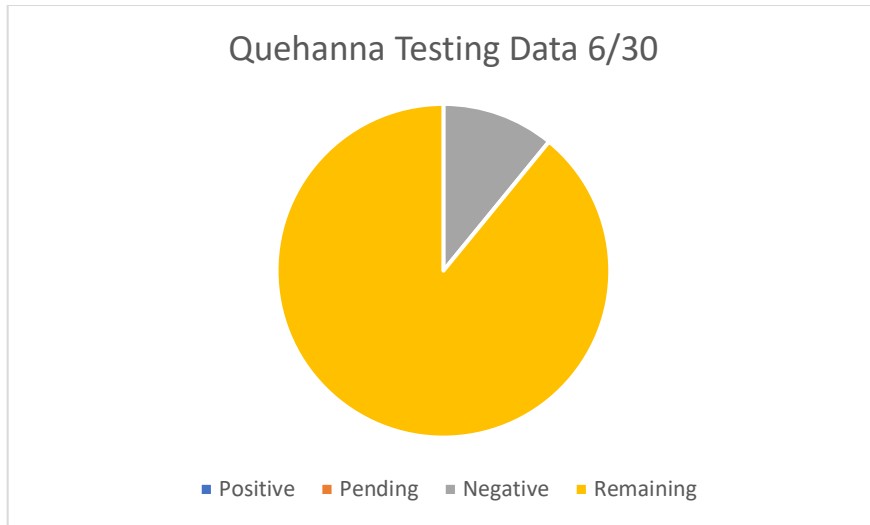


Figure 16: Quehanna Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 49, Remaining: 400.

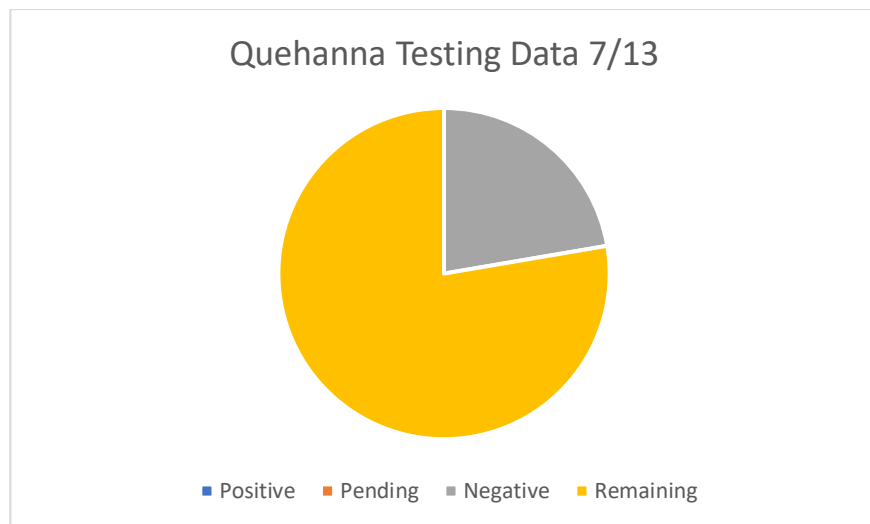


Figure 17: Quehanna Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 106, Remaining: 369.

### Conclusion

This paper provides aggregated data on rates of testing and cases of COVID-19 in Pennsylvania SCIs, pulling from data maintained by the PA DOC, the PA DOH, and The

Marshall Project. The discussion surrounding the data relies in part on scholarly and media commentary. As was seen through the population data presented, and furthered in Appendix B, every SCI differed in how their population changed over time. While some ended with a lower population after the time period analyzed, this was not common. The testing data shows that the majority of the tests administered were negative (PA DOC, 2020), and allowed for comparison to the rate of testing. However, this was limited to inmates.

The Marshall Project data provides interesting comparisons in case, death, and testing rates for the prison facilities to the general public. While many argued that there would be a surge of cases among the prison systems (Milner, 2020) the case and death rates were lower for Pennsylvania prison inmates, while the testing rates were higher (The Marshall Project, 2020). However, this was not true for SCI staff members who, alarmingly, had a *higher case frequency* with *lower testing* (The Marshall Project, 2020). The death rates were lower for staff, as they were for inmates (The Marshall Project, 2020). These findings could be further explored by expanded research into how the ages of prisoners compared to that of staff could have played a role in these discrepancies. Additionally, more research can be done into preventative measures taken to protect the health of the staff, and how daily movement between the community and the SCIs could have played a role. More research also could be done on why the population changes within each facility took place and research into the mental health effects of prolonged quarantining for many inmates. Finally, opinions of staff members to understand their views on how the COVID-19 pandemic effected the prison system and what can be done moving forward and in contingency planning. As the Commonwealth continues to develop plans responsive to COVID-19 and other infectious diseases, particular attention should be given to correctional facility personnel.

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## Appendix A

### ORDER OF THE GOVERNOR OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA REGARDING INDIVIDUALS INCARCERATED IN STATE CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTIONS

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have declared the coronavirus disease 2019 (“COVID-19”) a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the President of the United States of America has declared the COVID-19 outbreak a national emergency and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (“HHS”) Secretary has declared the COVID-19 outbreak a public health emergency; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 7301(a) of the Emergency Management Services Code, 35 Pa. C.S. § 7301(a), I am charged with the responsibility to address dangers facing the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (“Commonwealth”) that result from disasters; and

WHEREAS, in executing the extraordinary powers outlined above, I am further authorized, pursuant to section 7301(b) of the Emergency Management Services Code, 35 Pa. C.S. § 7301(b), during a disaster emergency to issue, amend, and rescind executive orders, proclamations, and regulations, and those directives shall have the force and effect of law; and

WHEREAS, on March 6, 2020, pursuant to section 7301(c) of the Emergency Management Services Code, 35 Pa. C.S. § 7301(c), I proclaimed the existence of a disaster emergency throughout the Commonwealth as a result of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth has taken extraordinary but vital measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19, including ordering non-life sustaining businesses to close (pursuant to my Business Closure Order of March 19, 2020, and as amended thereafter) and ordering all Commonwealth individuals to stay at home (pursuant to my Stay at Home Order of April 1, 2020); and

WHEREAS, as of April 10, 2020, 19,979 persons have tested positive for COVID-19 in the Commonwealth in all 67 counties, and 416 persons are reported to have died from the virus; and

WHEREAS, the complexities associated with mitigating the spread of COVID-19 in general are even more heightened in the corrections environment, as evidenced by the advisement from the World Health Organization that prisons around the world can expect “huge mortality rates” from COVID-19 unless they take immediate action, and that the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has issued specific guidance for disease prevention and control in these and other congregate settings; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary for the Department of Health has advised that on balance, as a general public health matter, considering all of the information available regarding the virus, its spread, and concerns relating to congregate facilities, particularly prisons and jails, and the ability to respond to the pandemic, minimizing the number of individuals in correctional facilities reduces the risk of rapid transmission of COVID-19 between residents and staff in correctional facilities by better allowing for the institution of social distancing and other mitigation efforts; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary for the Department of Corrections has identified individuals who are currently incarcerated by the Department of Corrections, including those who are at greater risk from the effects of COVID-19, and who may be temporarily and safely released from the current sentence of state incarceration to supervised community placement; and

WHEREAS, in addition to general powers during a disaster emergency, I am specifically authorized, pursuant to section 7301(f)(5) and (7) of the Emergency Management Services Code, 35 Pa. C.S. § 7301(f)(5) and (7), to direct and compel the evacuation of all or part of the population from any stricken or threatened area within this Commonwealth if this action is necessary for the preservation of life or other disaster mitigation, response, or recovery and to control ingress and egress to and from a disaster area, the movement of persons within the area, and the occupancy of premises therein; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article IV, Section 9 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Pa. Const. Art. IV, § 9(a), I am specifically authorized to grant reprieves in all criminal cases except impeachment.

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me and the Executive branch by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, I do hereby ORDER and PROCLAIM as follows:

The Pennsylvania Department of Corrections shall establish a Reprieve of Sentence of Incarceration Program as the Department of Corrections deems necessary to transfer to Community Corrections Centers, Community Corrections Facilities, or home confinement vulnerable individuals who would otherwise be eligible for release within the next twelve (12) months; or any inmate within nine (9) months of their minimum eligibility release date. In either instance, the inmates must meet the defined criterion and the release must not pose a risk to public safety.

Vulnerable inmates shall include inmates at risk based upon age, anyone with autoimmune disorders, who is pregnant, or who has serious chronic medical conditions like heart disease, diabetes, chronic respiratory disease, bone marrow or organ transplantation, severe obesity, kidney disease, liver disease, and cancer, or other medical condition that places them at higher risk for coronavirus, as defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Regardless of the sentence imposed, the Reprieve of Sentence of Incarceration Program would not apply to:

- (1) persons committed for or with an aggregate sentence containing a personal injury crime, or any criminal attempt, criminal solicitation, or criminal conspiracy to commit a personal injury crime as defined in section 103 of the act of November 24, 1998 (P.L.882, No.111), known as the Crime Victims Act;
- (2) persons committed for or with an aggregate sentence containing a crime of violence, or any criminal attempt, criminal solicitation, or criminal conspiracy to commit a crime of violence as defined in 42 Pa.C.S. § 9714(g) (relating to sentences for second or subsequent offenses);
- (3) persons committed for or with an aggregate sentence containing an offense under 18 Pa.C.S. Ch. 61 (relating to firearms and other dangerous articles) or a criminal attempt, criminal solicitation, or criminal conspiracy to commit the offense;
- (4) persons committed for or with an aggregate sentence containing an enhancement for the use of a deadly weapon as defined under law or the sentencing guidelines promulgated by the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing or where the attorney for the Commonwealth has demonstrated that the defendant has been found guilty of or was convicted of an offense involving a deadly weapon or a criminal attempt, criminal solicitation, or criminal conspiracy to commit the offense or an equivalent offense under the laws of the United States or one of its territories or possessions, another state, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, or a foreign nation;
- (5) persons committed for or with an aggregate sentence containing a violation of any of the following provisions or an equivalent offense under the laws of the United States or one of its territories or possessions, another state, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, or a foreign nation, including a criminal attempt, criminal solicitation or criminal conspiracy to commit the offense:

18 Pa.C.S. § 4302(a) (relating to incest).

18 Pa.C.S. § 5901 (relating to open lewdness).

18 Pa.C.S. Ch. 76 Subch. C (relating to Internet child pornography).

A criminal sentence pursuant to 42 Pa.C.S. § 9712.1 (relating to sentences for certain drug offenses committed with firearms).



An offense listed under 42 Pa.C.S. Ch. 97 Subch. H (relating to registration of sexual offenders). An offense listed under 42 Pa.C.S. Ch. 97 Subch. I (relating to continued registration of sexual offenders).

(6) persons committed for or with an aggregate sentence containing an offense of drug trafficking as defined in section 4103 (relating to definitions) or a criminal attempt, criminal solicitation, or criminal conspiracy to commit drug trafficking as defined in section 4103;

(7) persons who are subject to a pending felony or misdemeanor arrest warrant or detainer;

(8) persons who are currently serving a sentence to State prison and have been denied parole on that sentence;

(9) persons convicted of any criminal offense committed while incarcerated;

(10) persons who pose an identifiable risk to public safety; or

(11) persons with a prior conviction within the past 10 years for any crime contained under paragraphs (1) - (5) above.

Notwithstanding any criterion set forth above, a person who has received a positive Board Action from the Parole Board and who remains incarcerated is eligible for the Reprieve of Sentence of Incarceration Program.

Further, the Department will confer with the Court, the Office of Attorney General, and District Attorney's Office in the county from which the inmate was sentenced prior to any inmate being recommended by the Department pursuant to this program.

Each inmate that the Department recommends through the Reprieve of Sentence of Incarceration Program will be submitted to me for consideration for issuance of a conditional reprieve. Each reprieve will be contingent upon compliance with all terms and conditions of community supervision imposed by the Department. The reprieves will temporarily suspend the sentences of incarceration of those persons who qualify and comply with supervision requirements for such length of time as may be necessary to respond to the Disaster Emergency proclaimed on March 6, 2020, or at such time as the Disaster Emergency is terminated.

This order is effective immediately and shall remain in effect for the duration of the disaster emergency.

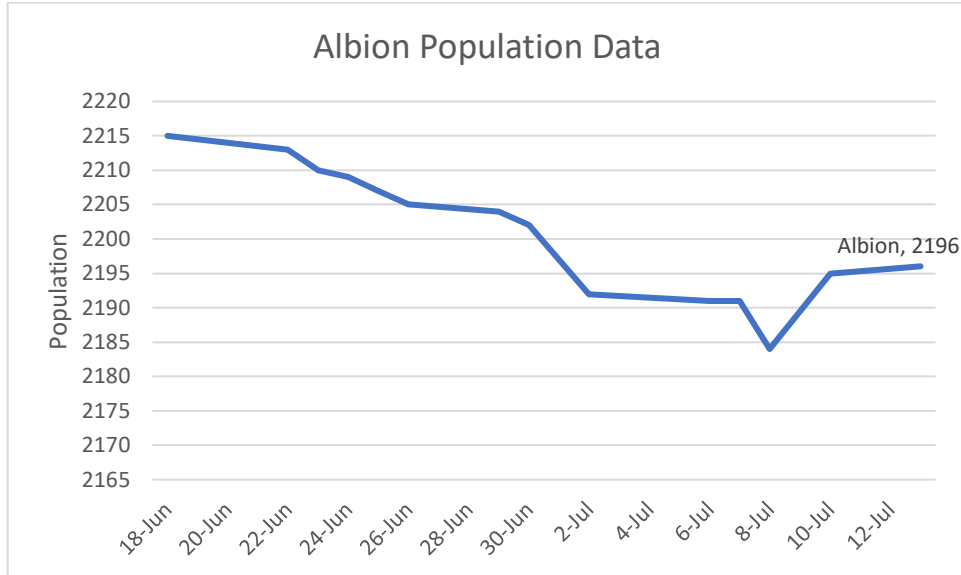


Figure 1: Albion Population Data.

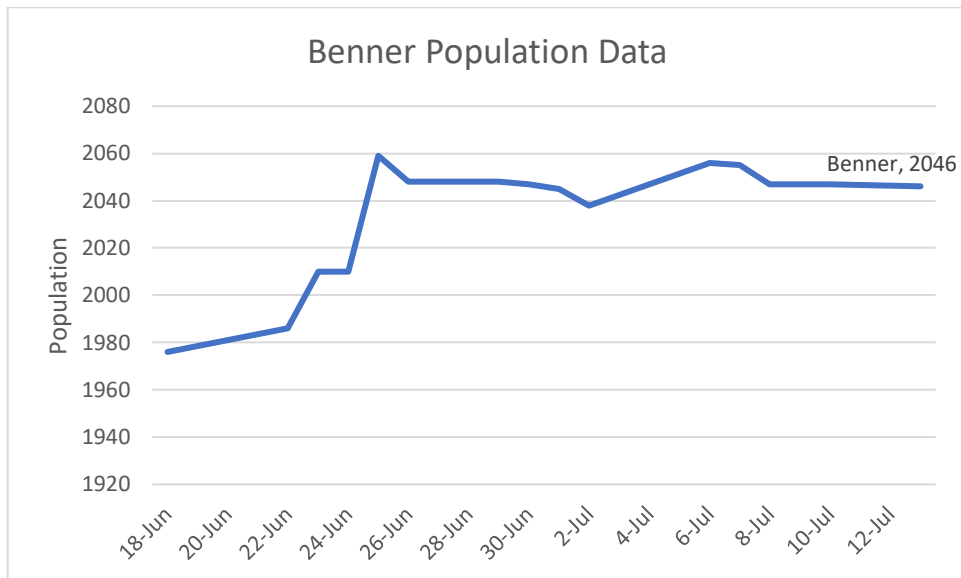


Figure 2: Benner Population Data.

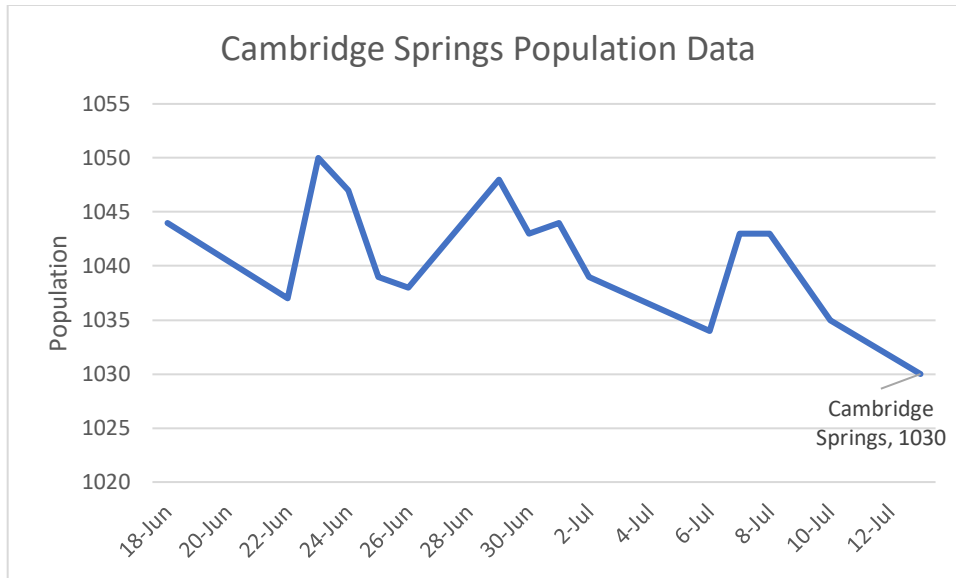


Figure 3: Cambridge Springs Population Data.

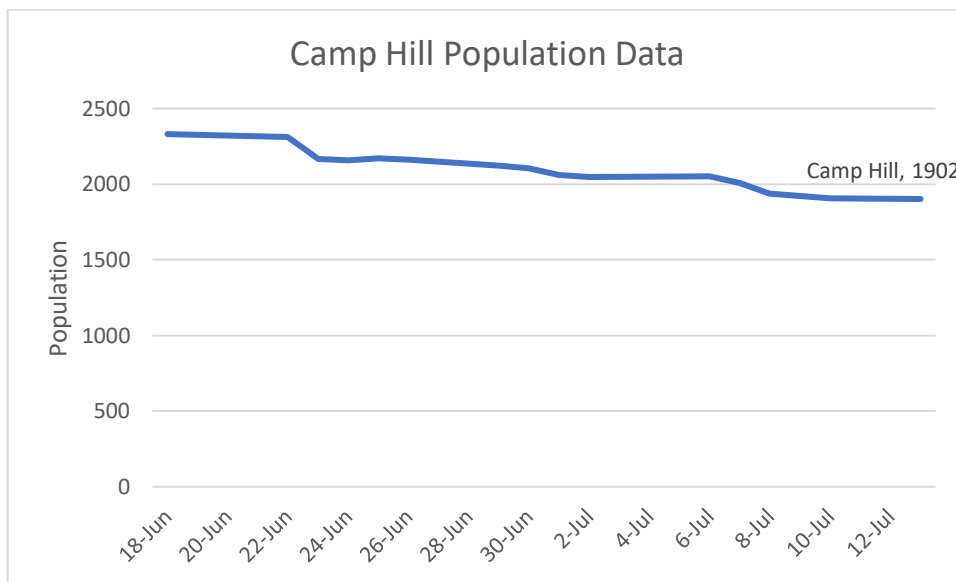


Figure 4: Camp Hill Population Data.

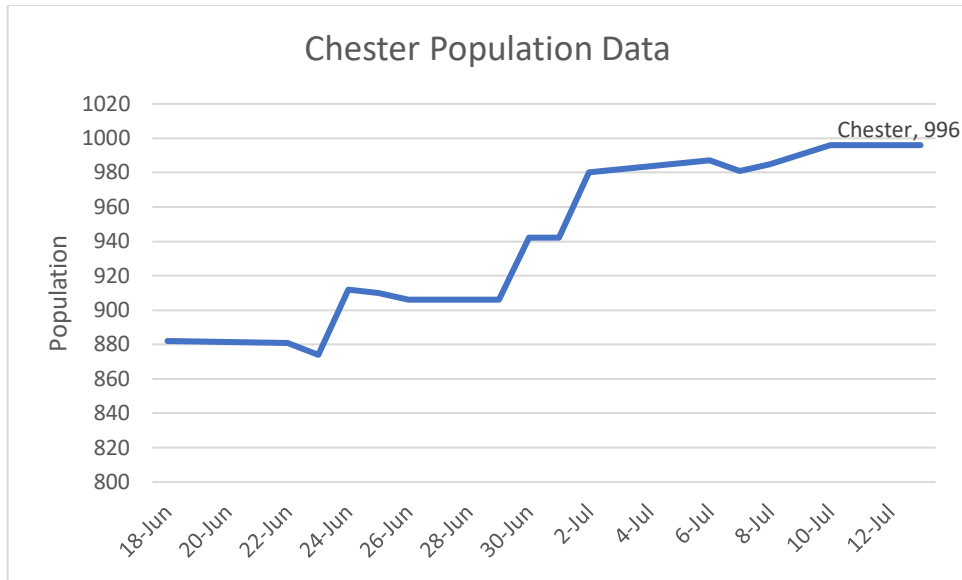


Figure 5: Chester Population Data.

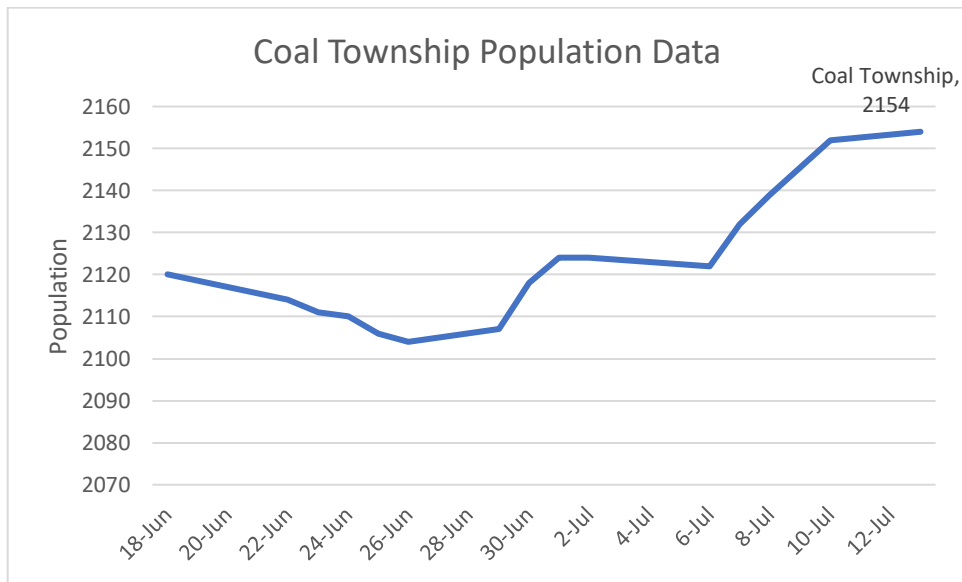


Figure 6: Coal Township Population Data.

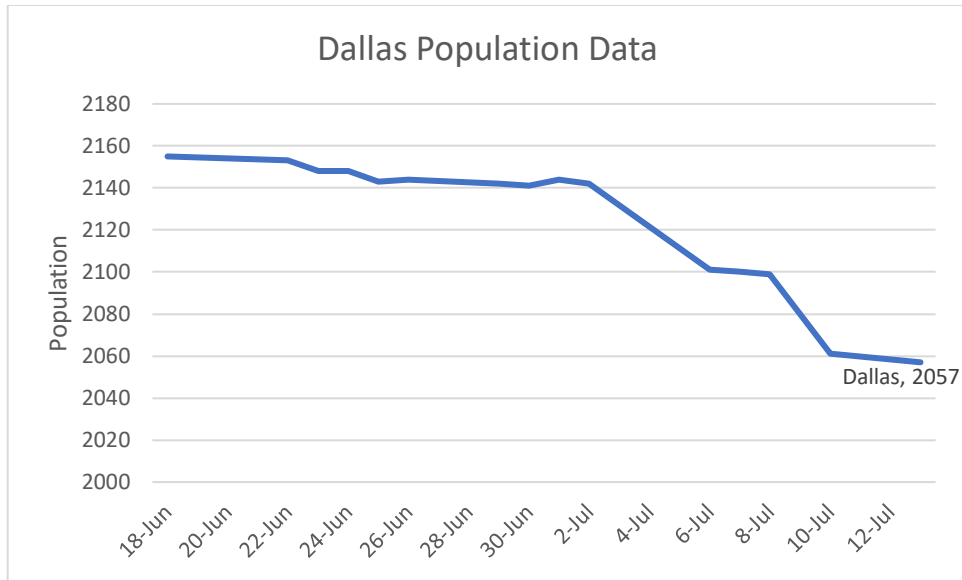


Figure 7: Dallas Population Data.

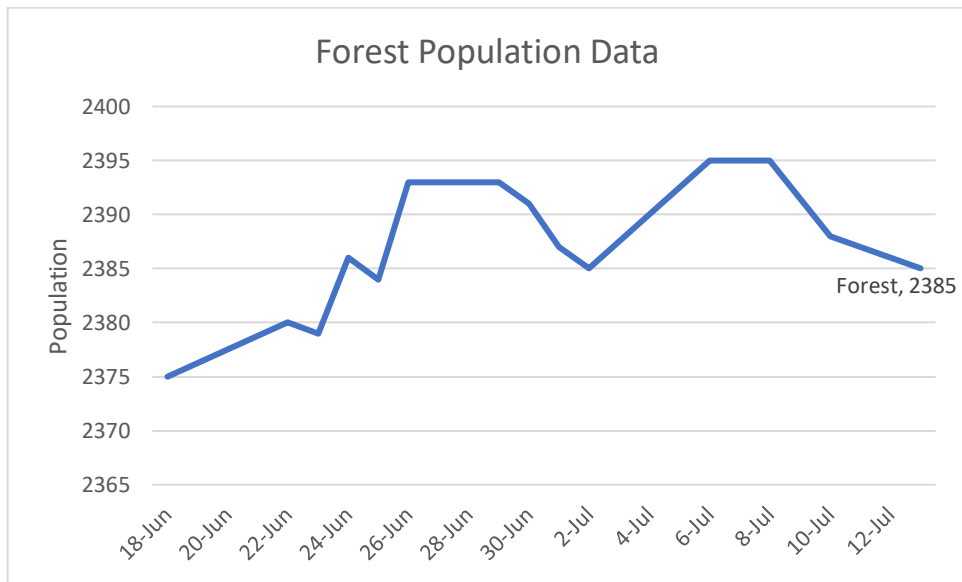


Figure 8: Forest Population Data.

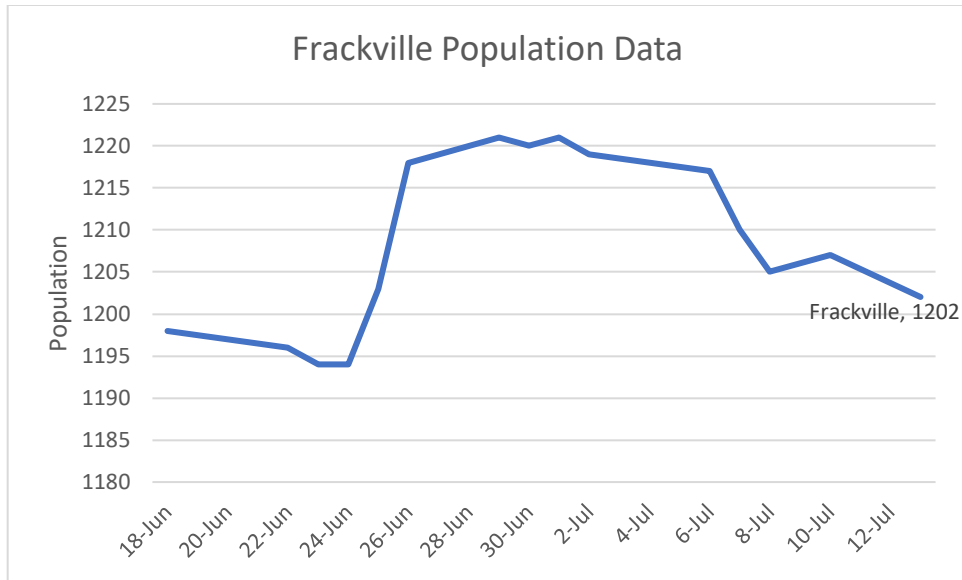


Figure 9: Frackville Population Data.

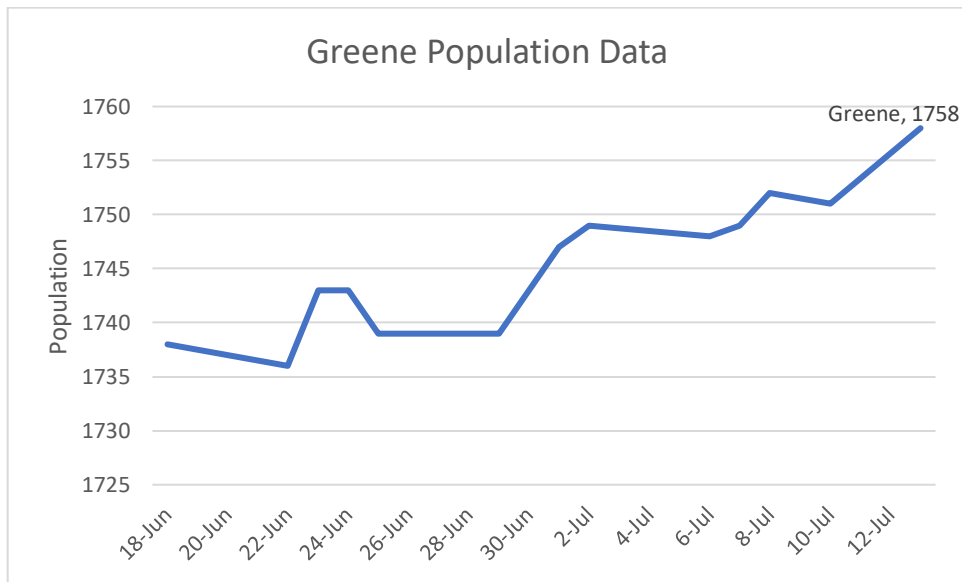


Figure 10: Greene Population Data.

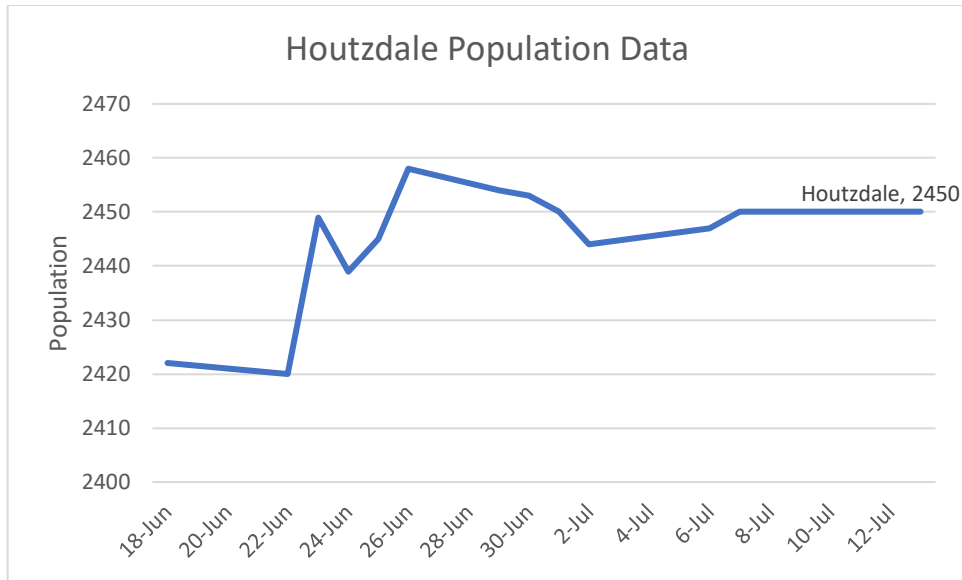


Figure 11: Houtzdale Population Data.

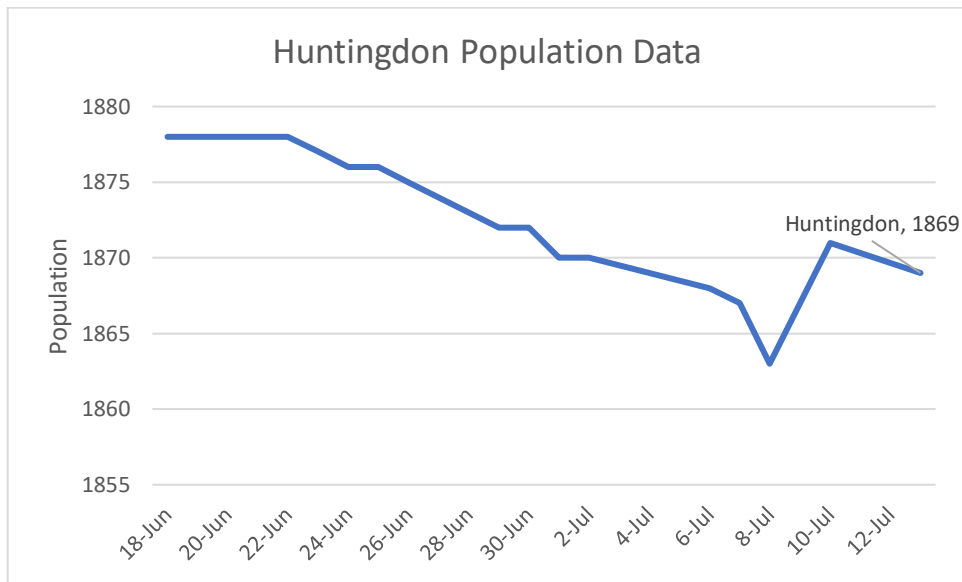


Figure 12: Huntingdon Population Data.

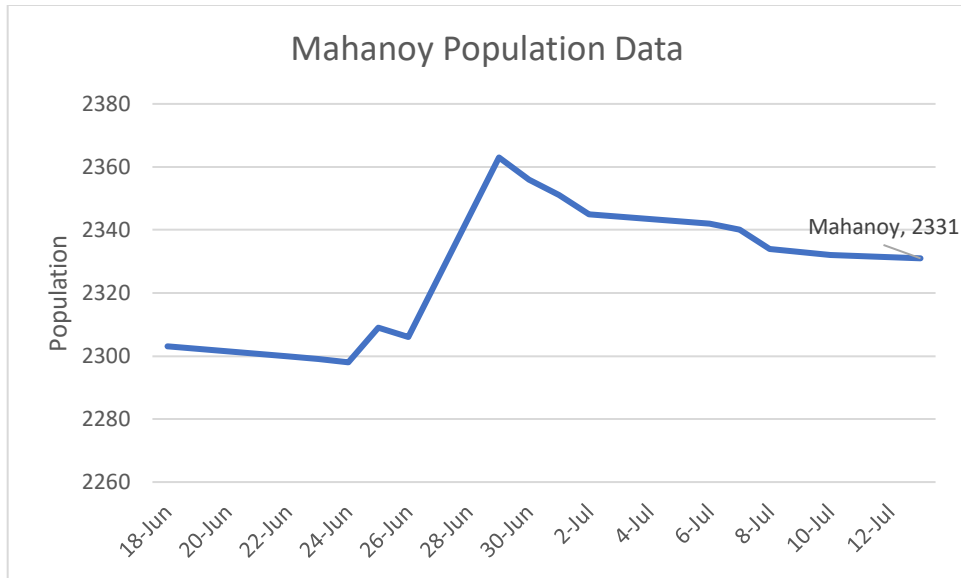


Figure 13: Mahoney Population Data.

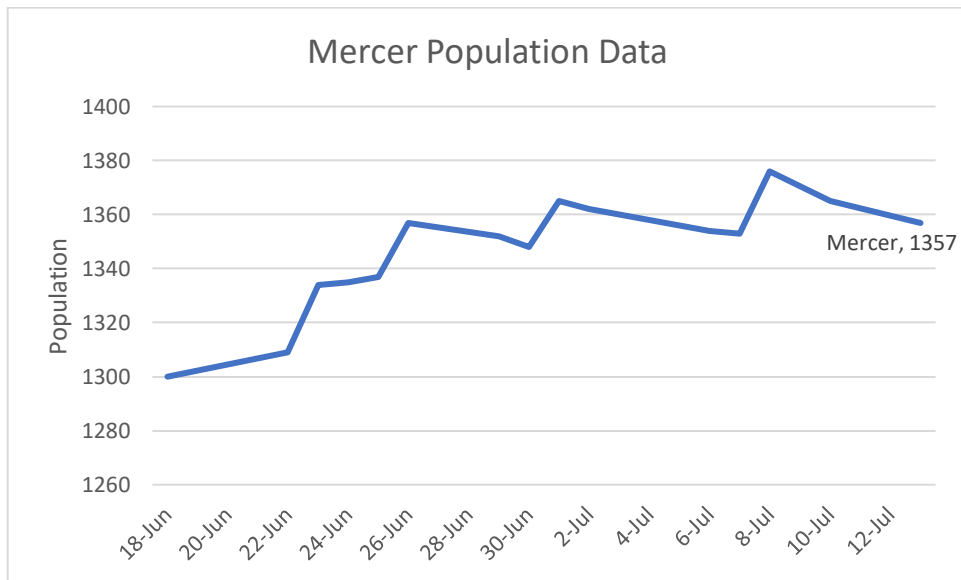


Figure 14: Mercer Population Data.

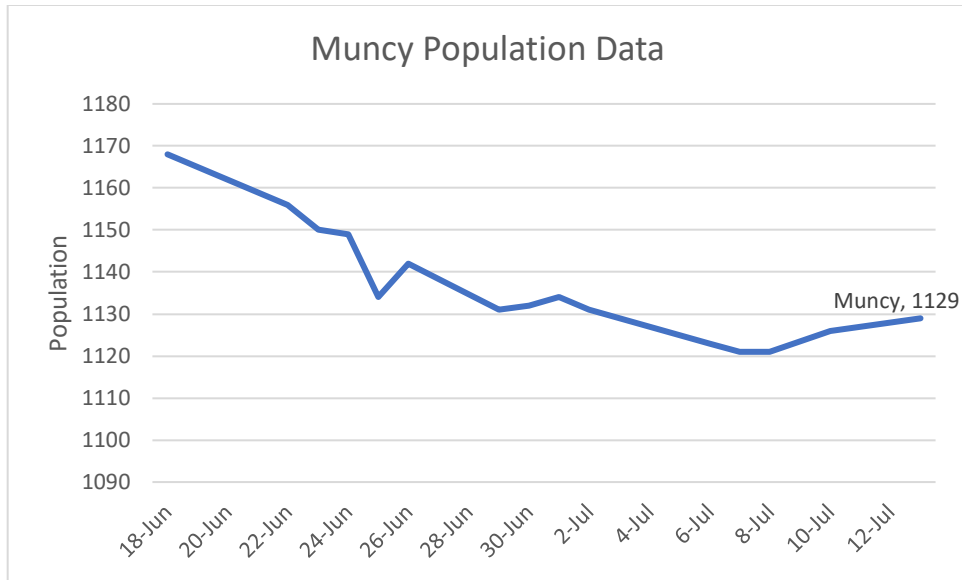


Figure 15: Muncy Population Data.

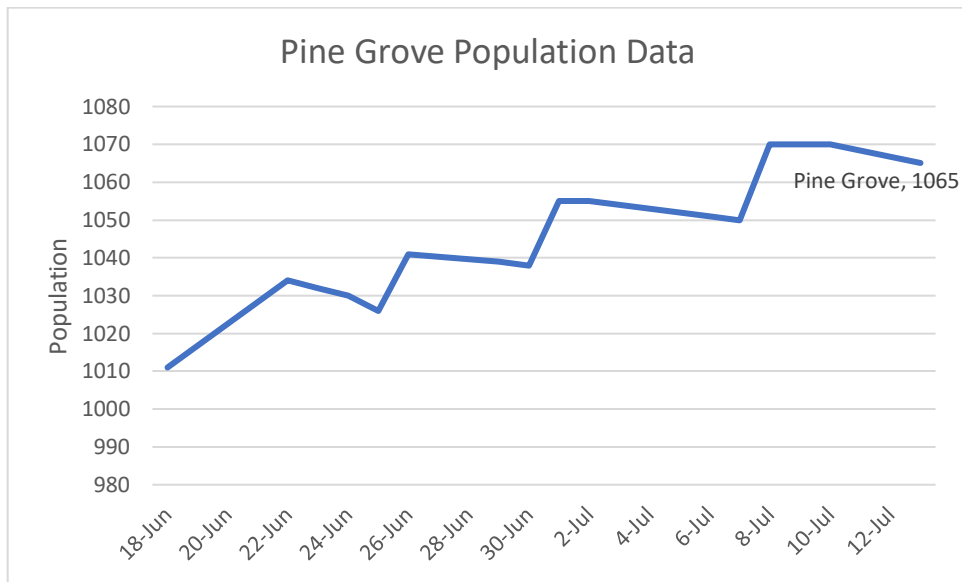


Figure 16: Pine Grove Population Data.

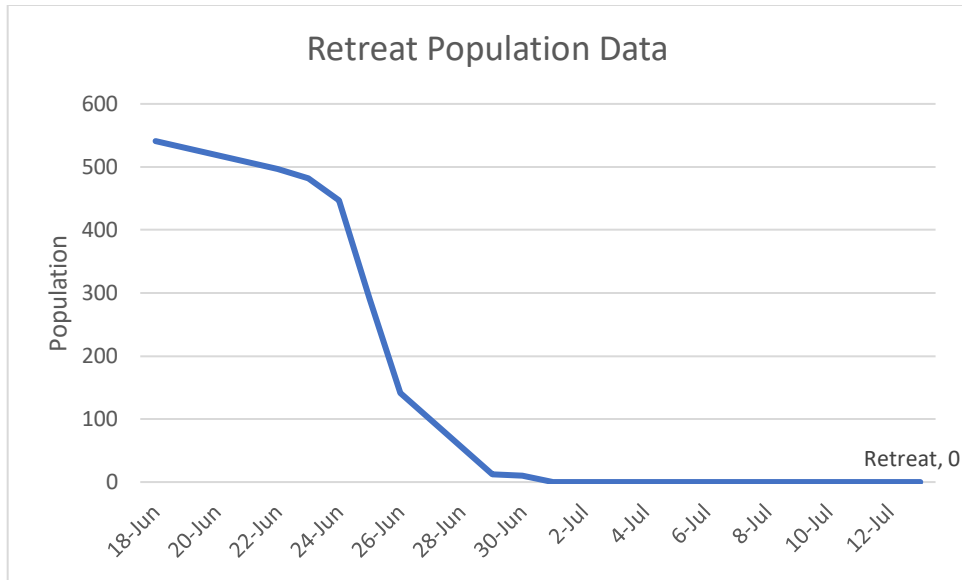


Figure 17: Retreat Population Data. Data specific to Retreat State Correctional Institution. Collected from the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections coronavirus webpage over the 25 day window on June 18<sup>th</sup> through July 13<sup>th</sup>. The Retreat location was closed on July 1<sup>st</sup>, explaining its population decrease to zero.

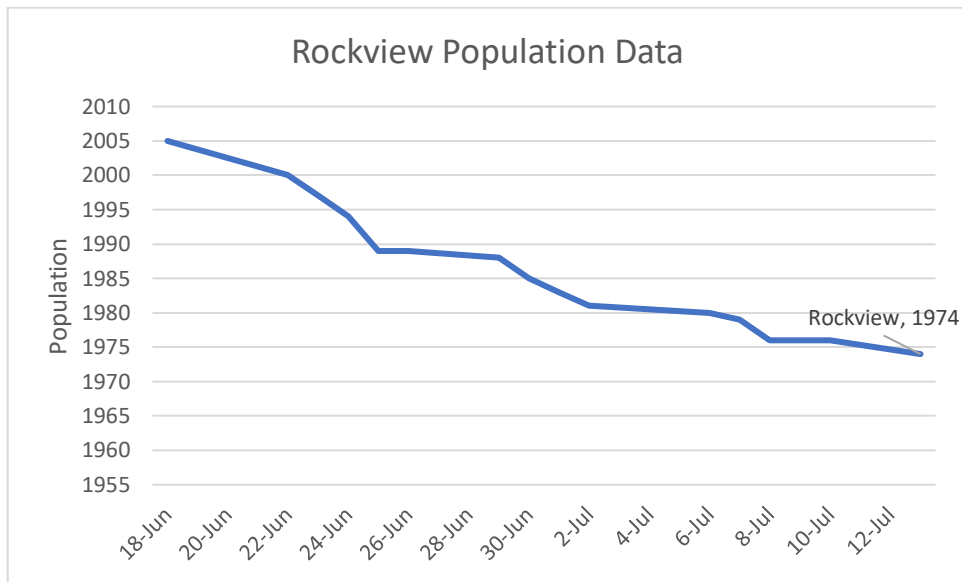


Figure 18: Rockview Population Data. Data specific to Rockview State Correctional Institution. Collected from the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections coronavirus webpage over the 25 day window on June 18<sup>th</sup> through July 13<sup>th</sup>.

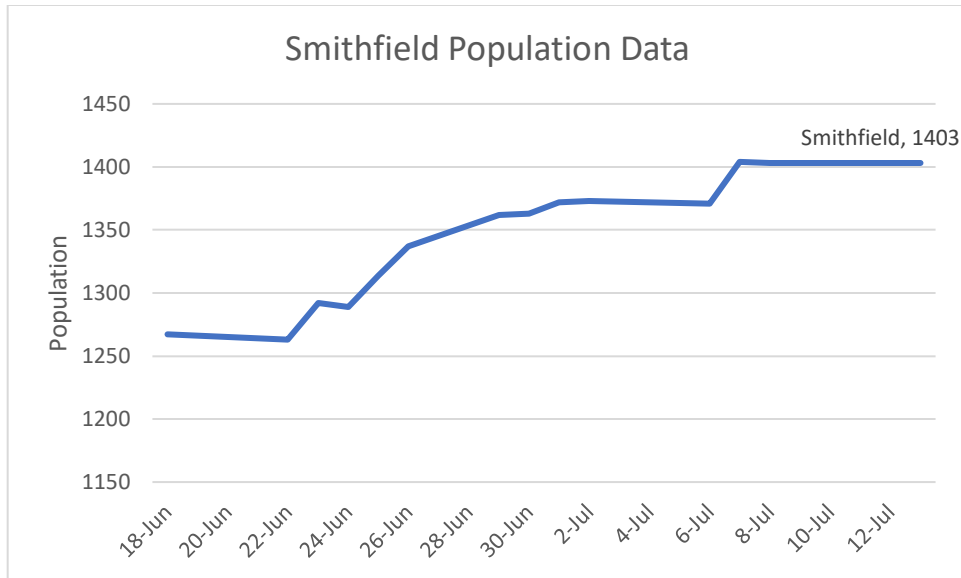


Figure 19: Smithfield Population Data.

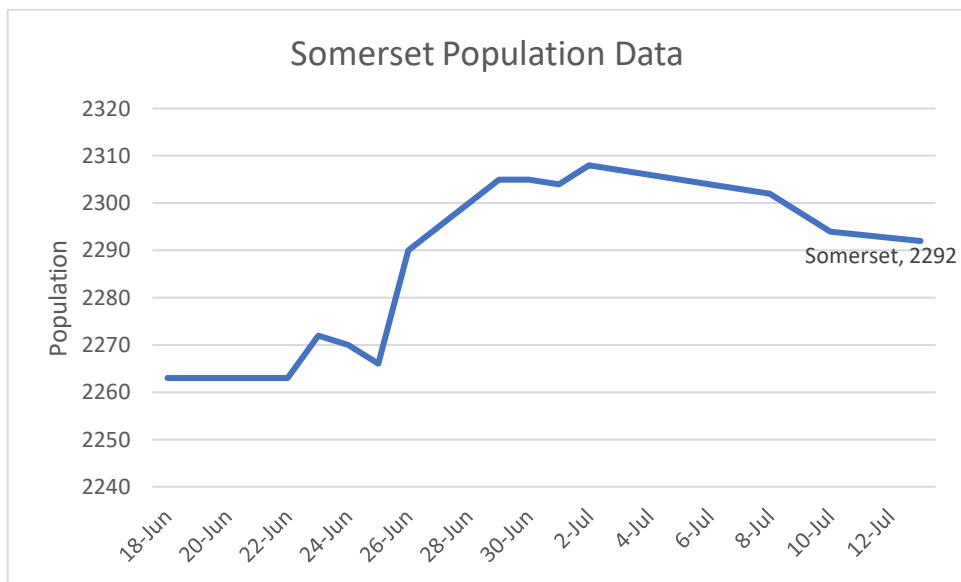


Figure 20: Somerset Population Data.

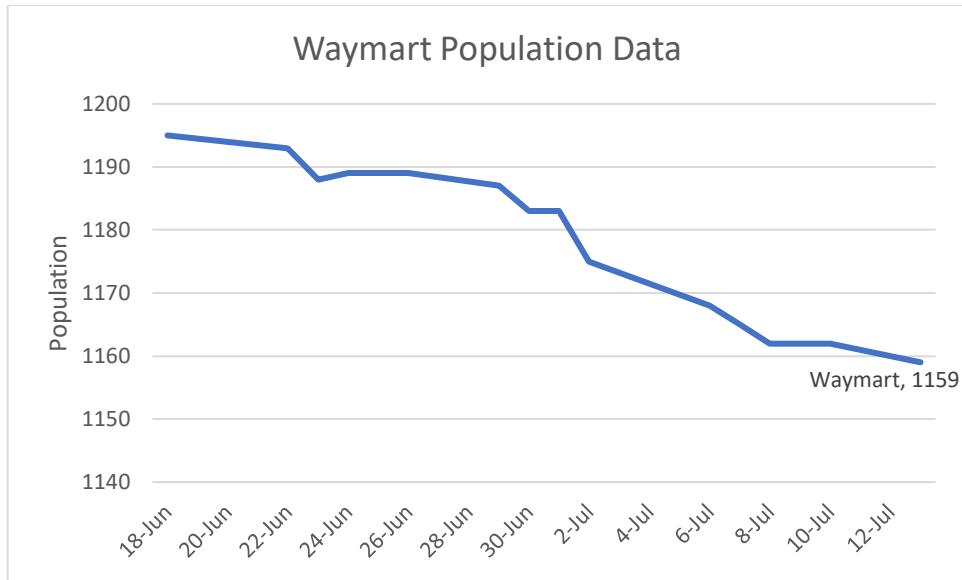


Figure 21: Waymart Population Data. Data specific to Waymart State Correctional Institution. Collected from the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections coronavirus webpage over the 25 day window on June 18<sup>th</sup> through July 13<sup>th</sup>.

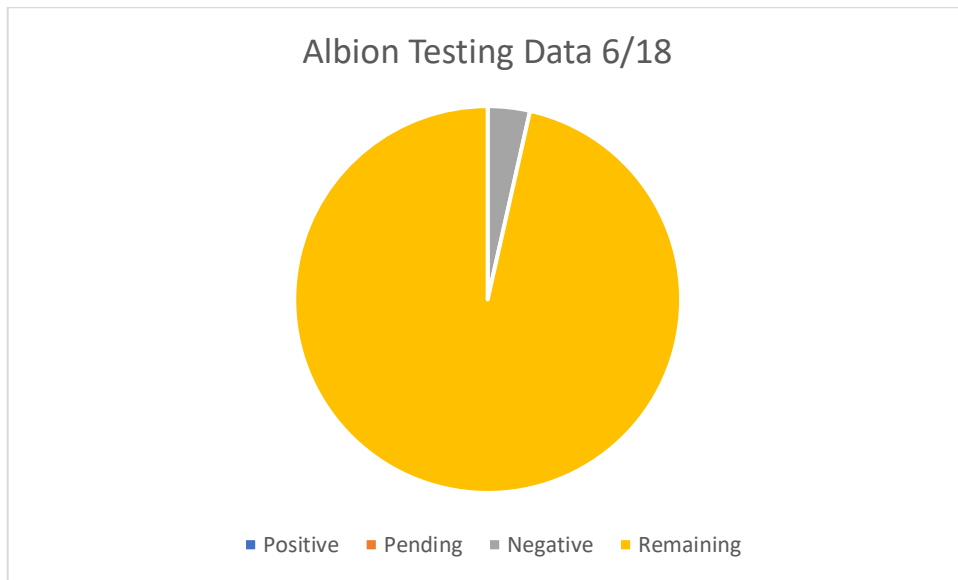


Figure 1: Albion Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 78, Remaining: 2137.

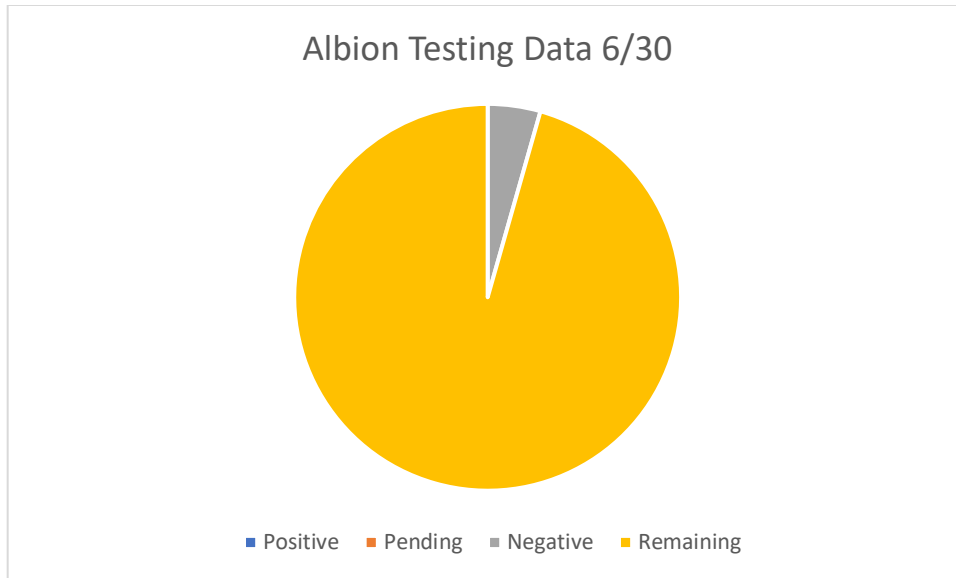


Figure 2: Albion Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 97, Remaining: 2105.

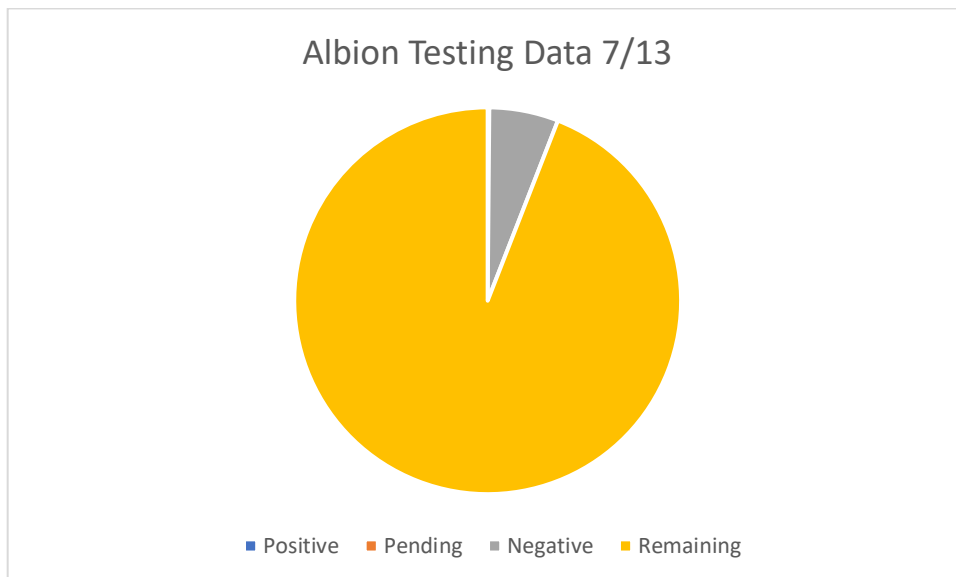


Figure 3: Albion Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 3, Pending: 0, Negative: 127, Remaining: 2066.

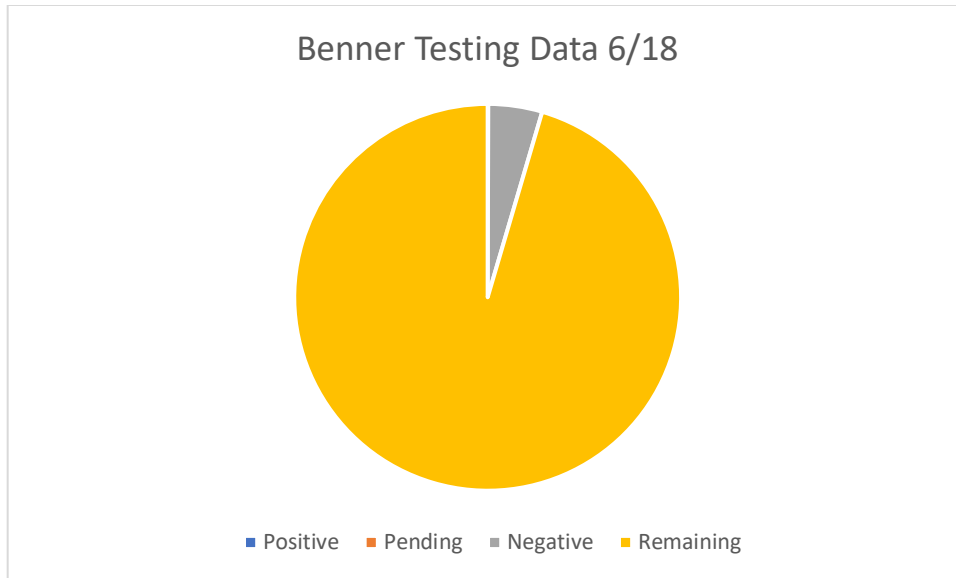


Figure 4: Benner Testing Data June 18th.

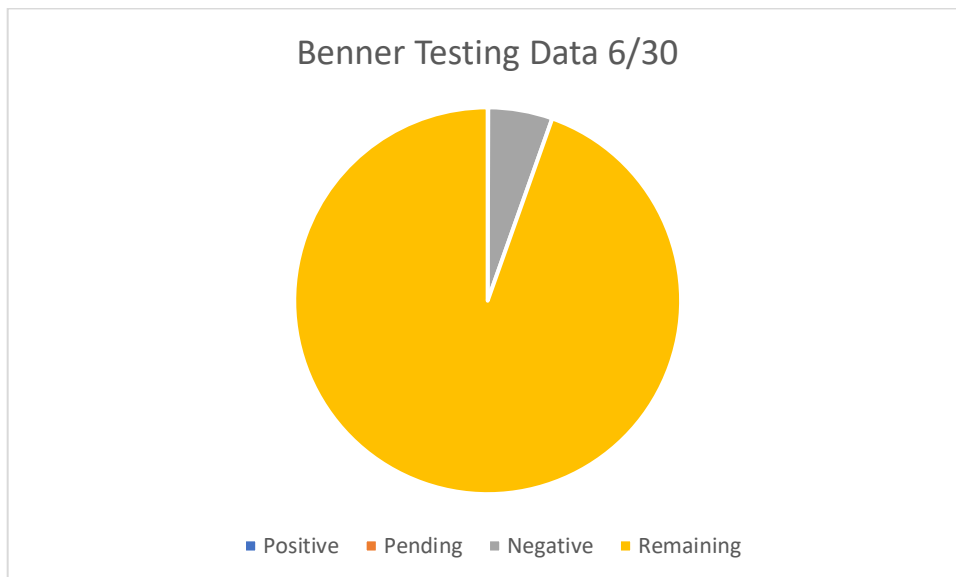


Figure 5: Benner Testing Data June 30th.

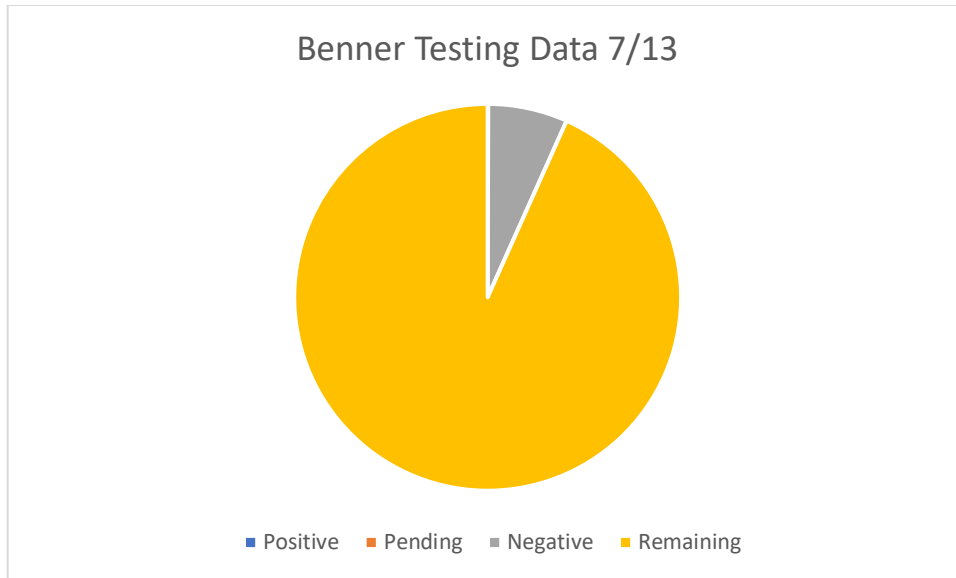


Figure 6: Benner Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 1, Pending: 0, Negative: 136, Remaining: 1909.

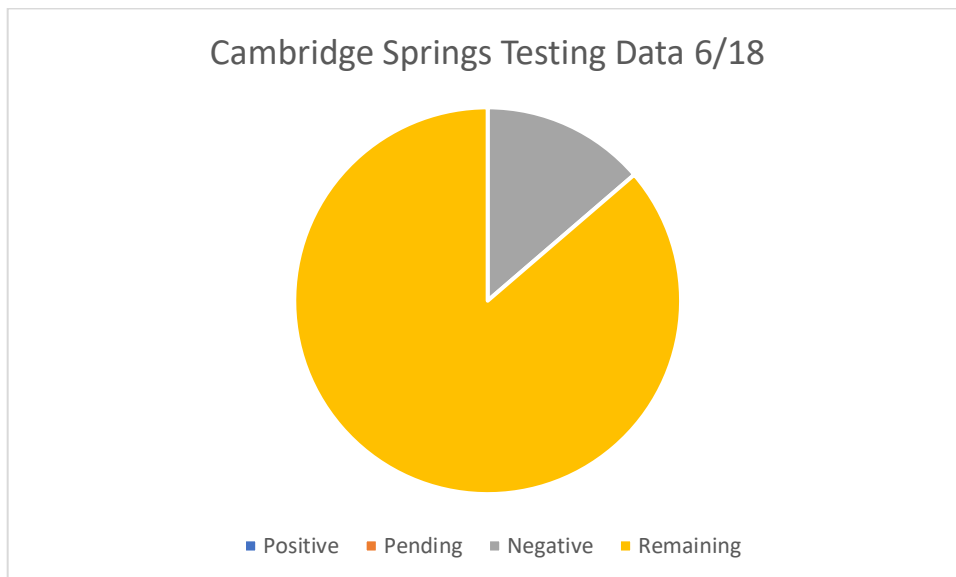


Figure 7: Cambridge Springs Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 143, Remaining: 901.

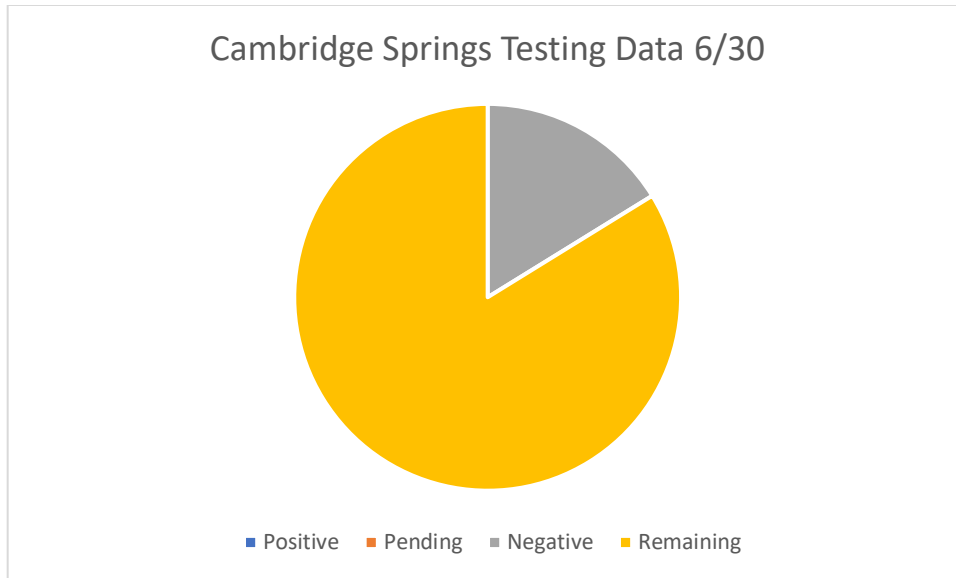


Figure 8: Cambridge Springs Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 169, Remaining: 874.

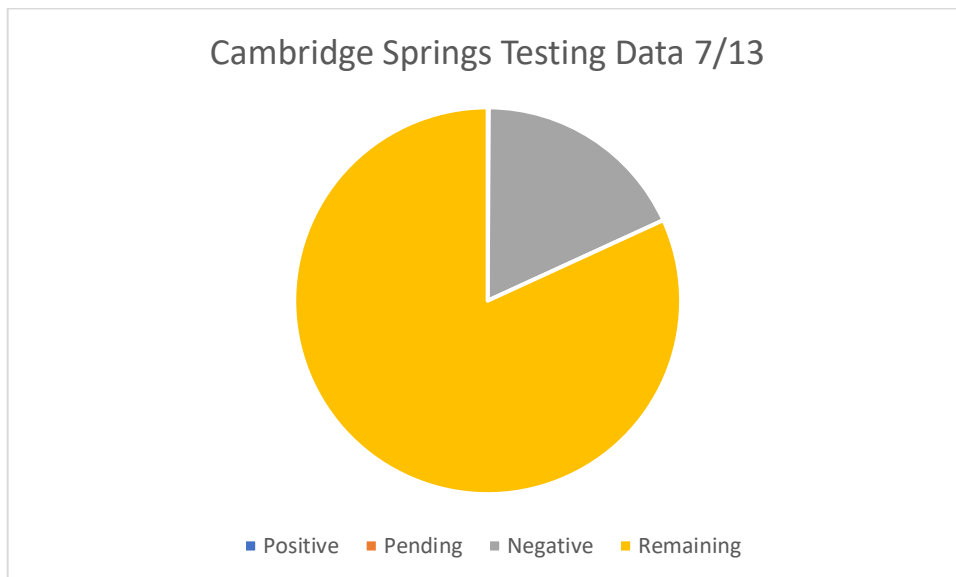


Figure 9: Cambridge Springs Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 1, Pending: 0, Negative: 186, Remaining: 843.



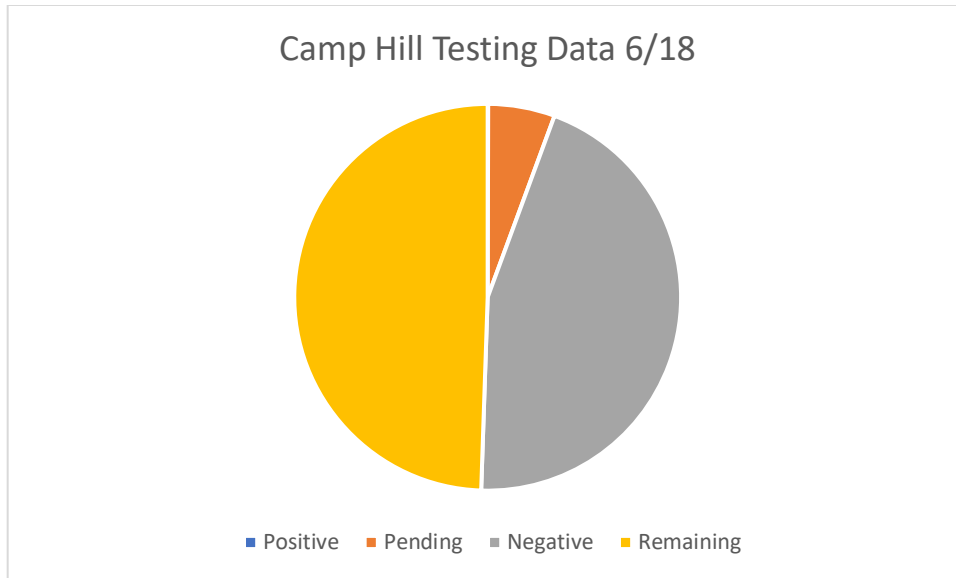


Figure 10: Camp Hill Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 1, Pending: 130, Negative: 1047, Remaining: 1153.

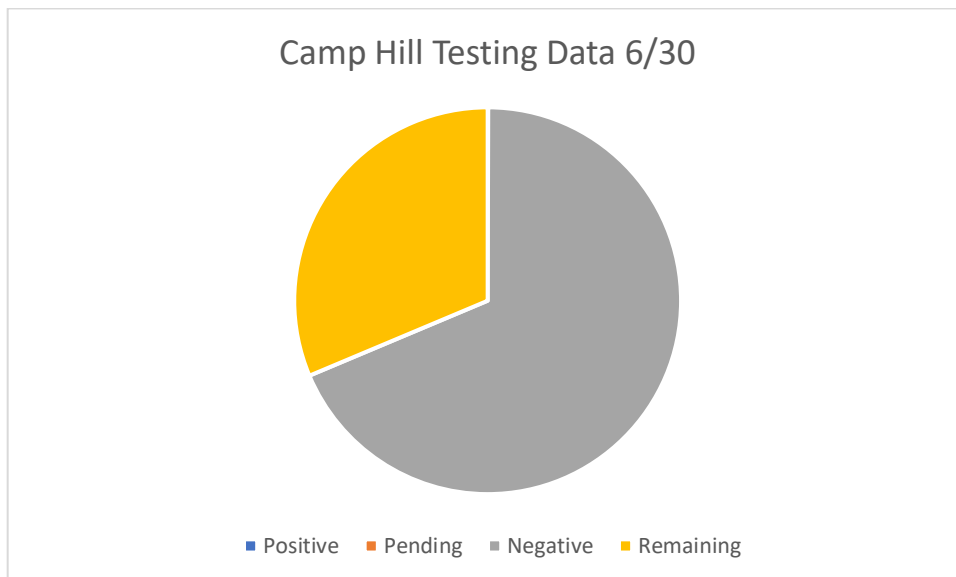


Figure 11: Camp Hill Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 1, Pending: 0, Negative: 1443, Remaining: 659.

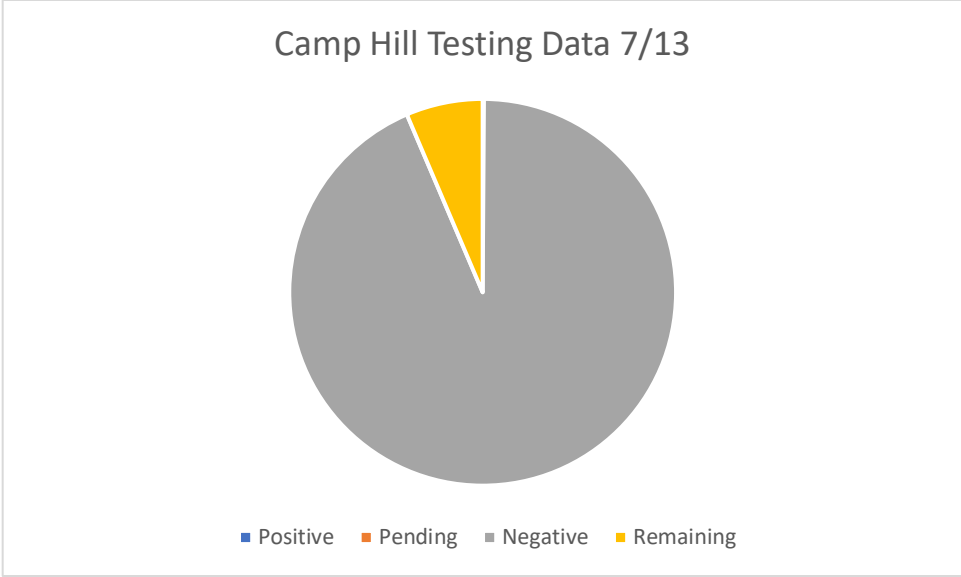


Figure 12: Camp Hill Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 1, Pending: 1, Negative: 1778, Remaining: 122.

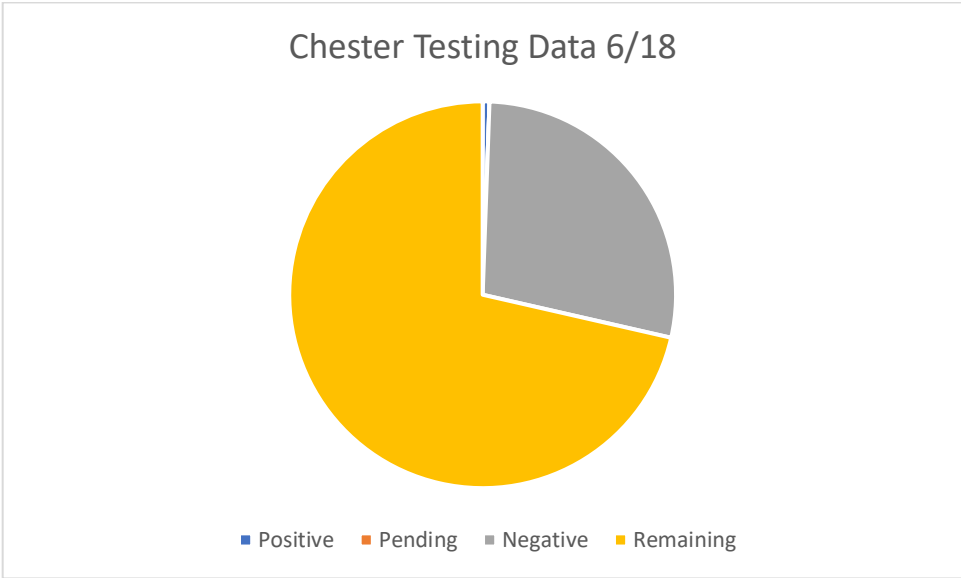


Figure 13: Chester Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 5, Pending: 0, Negative: 247, Remaining: 630.

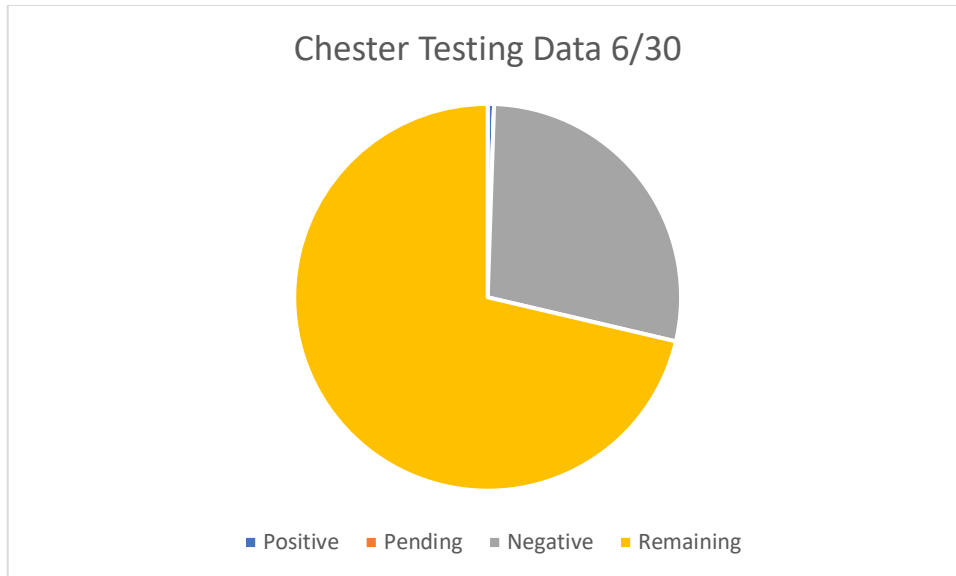


Figure 14: Chester Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 5, Pending: 0, Negative: 265, Remaining: 672.

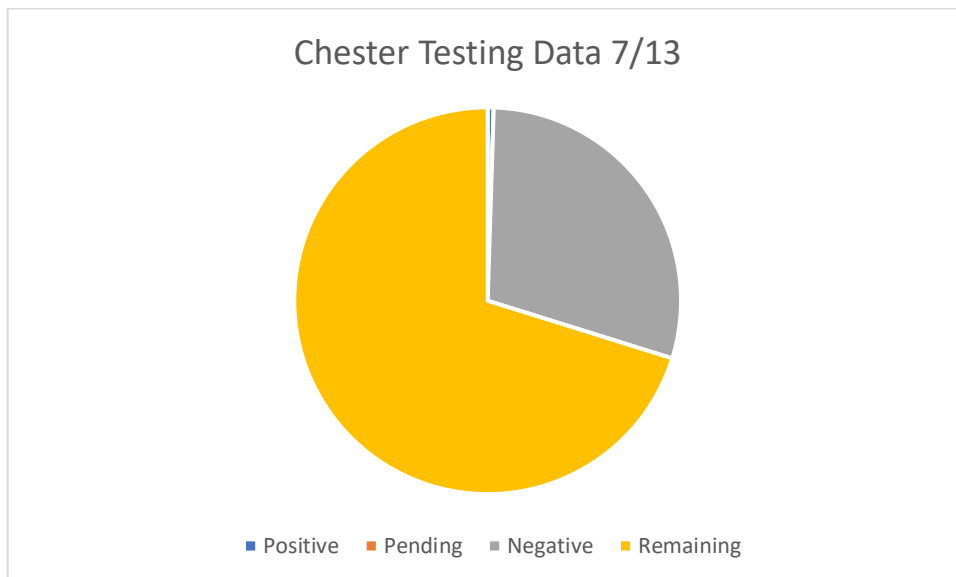


Figure 15: Chester Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 5, Pending: 0, Negative: 292, Remaining: 699.

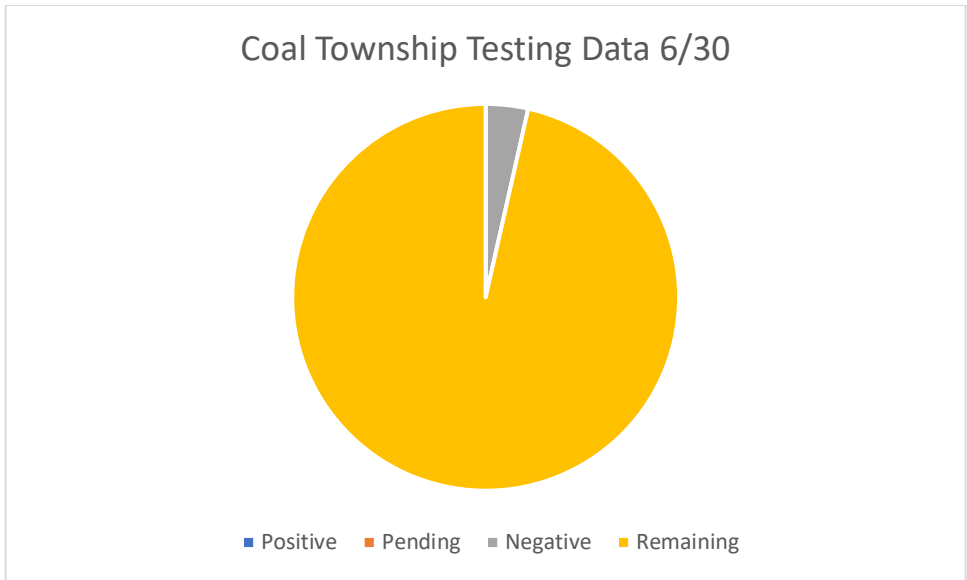


Figure 16: Coal Township Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 75, Remaining: 2045.

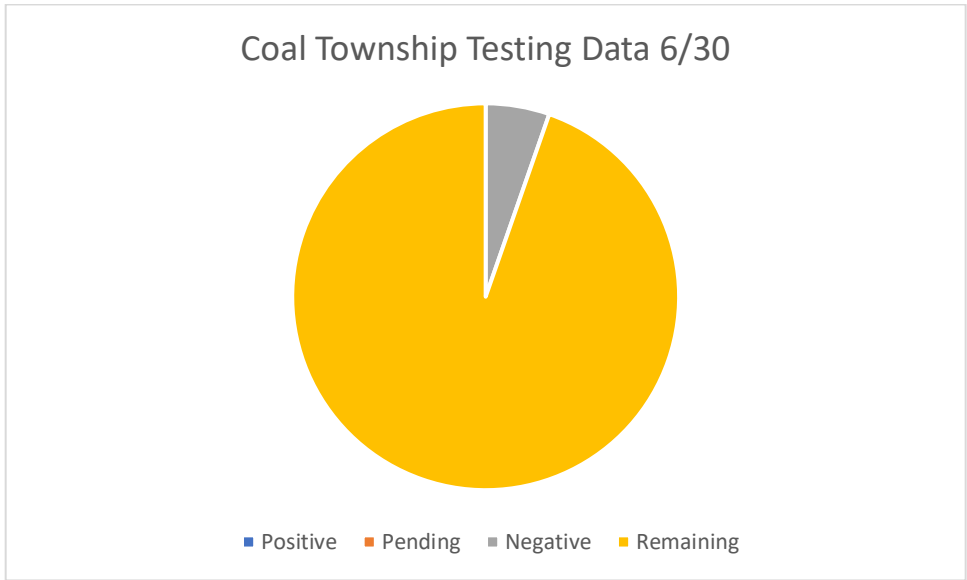


Figure 17: Coal Township Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 113, Remaining: 2005.

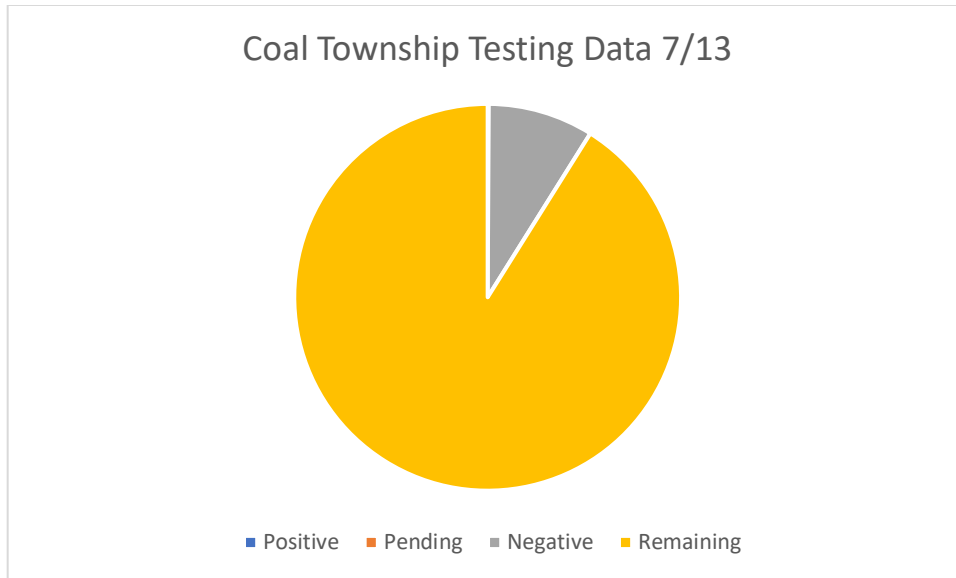


Figure 18: Coal Township Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 2, Pending: 0, Negative: 190, Remaining: 1962.

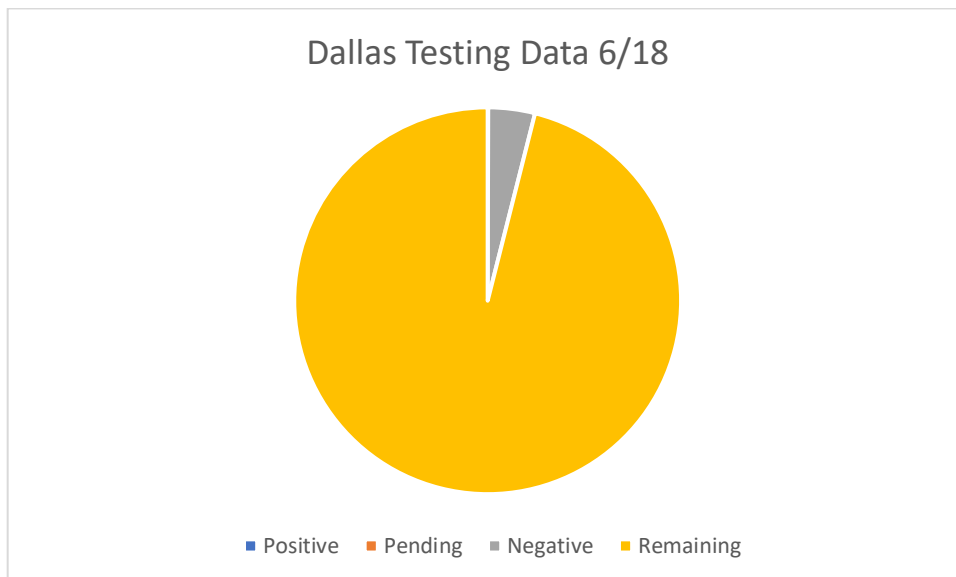


Figure 19: Dallas Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 1, Negative: 84, Remaining: 2070.

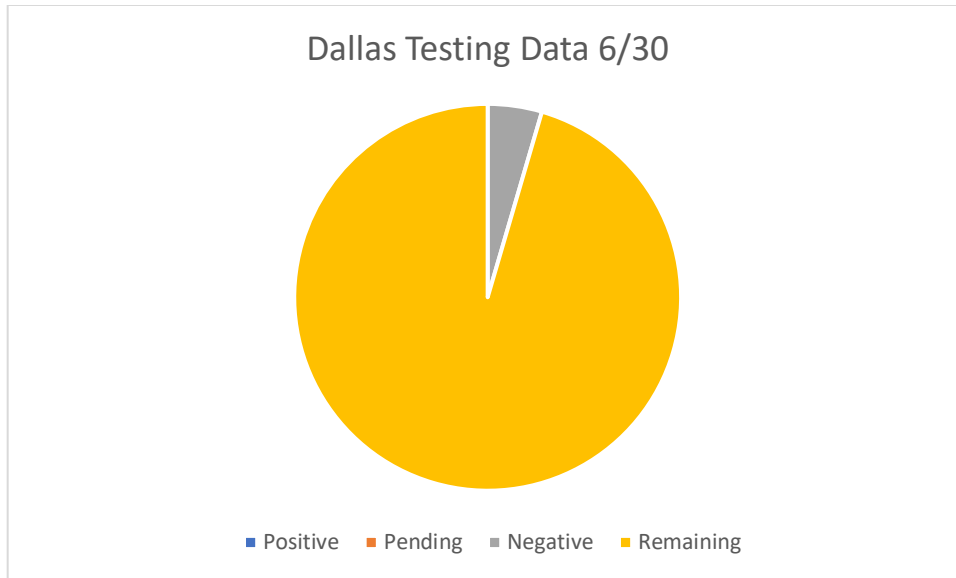


Figure 20: Dallas Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 97, Remaining: 2044.

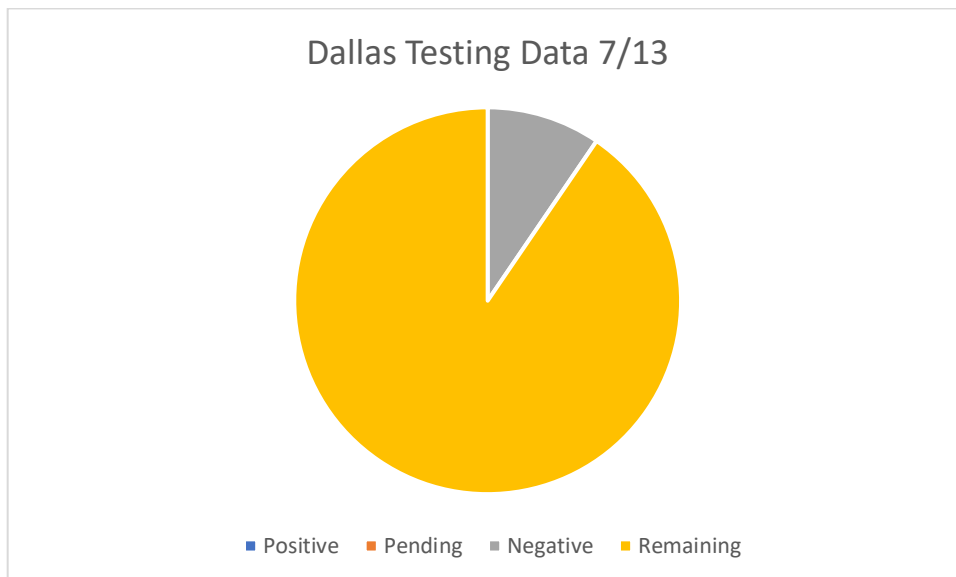


Figure 21: Dallas Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 196, Remaining: 1861.

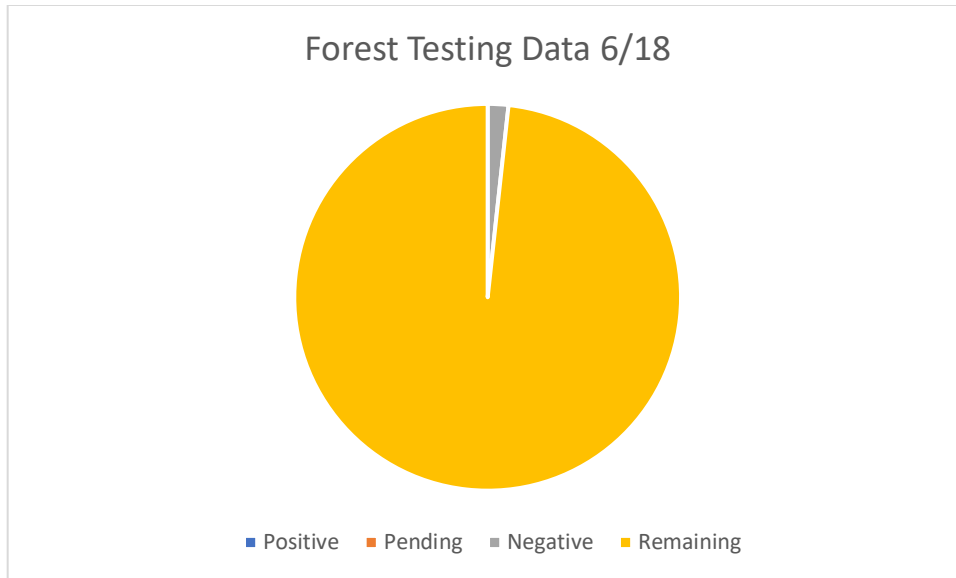


Figure 22: Forest Testing Data June 18th. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 41, Remaining: 2334.

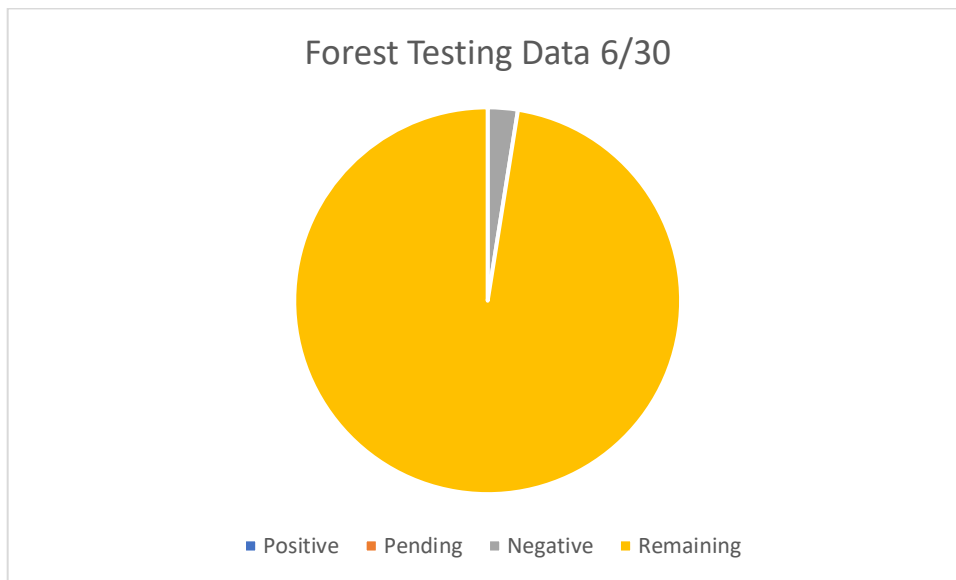


Figure 23: Forest Testing Data June 30th. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 60, Remaining: 2331.

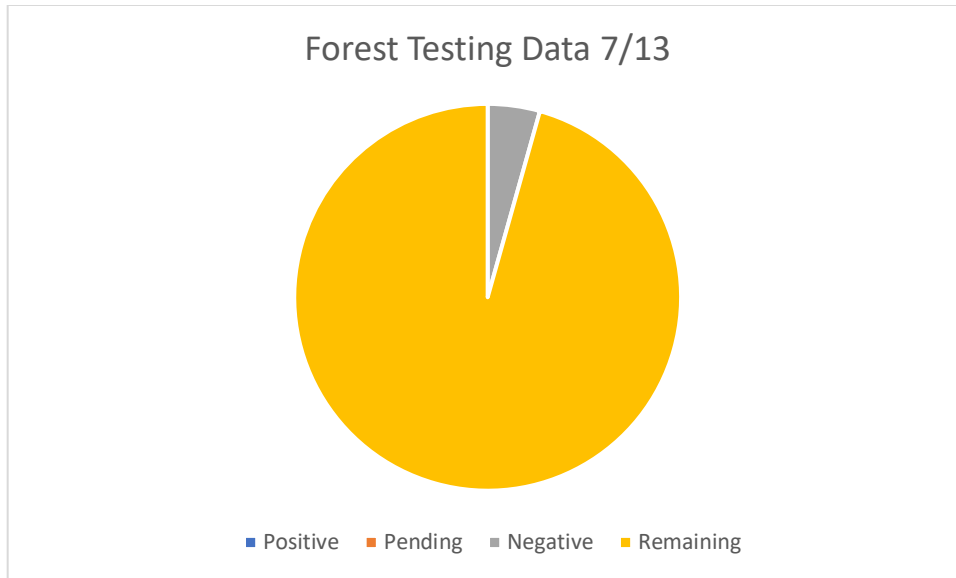


Figure 24: Forest Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 104, Remaining: 2282.

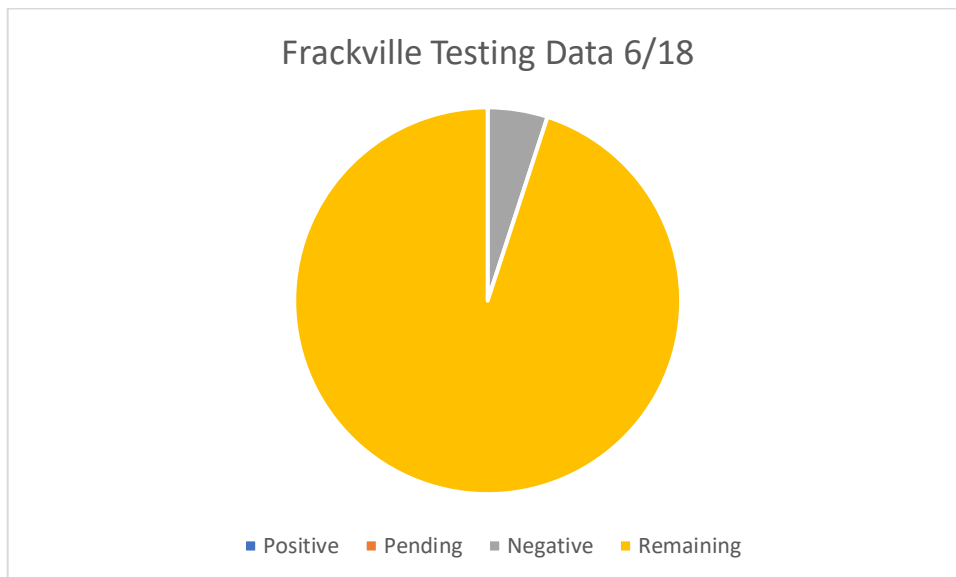


Figure 25: Frackville Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 60, Remaining: 1138.



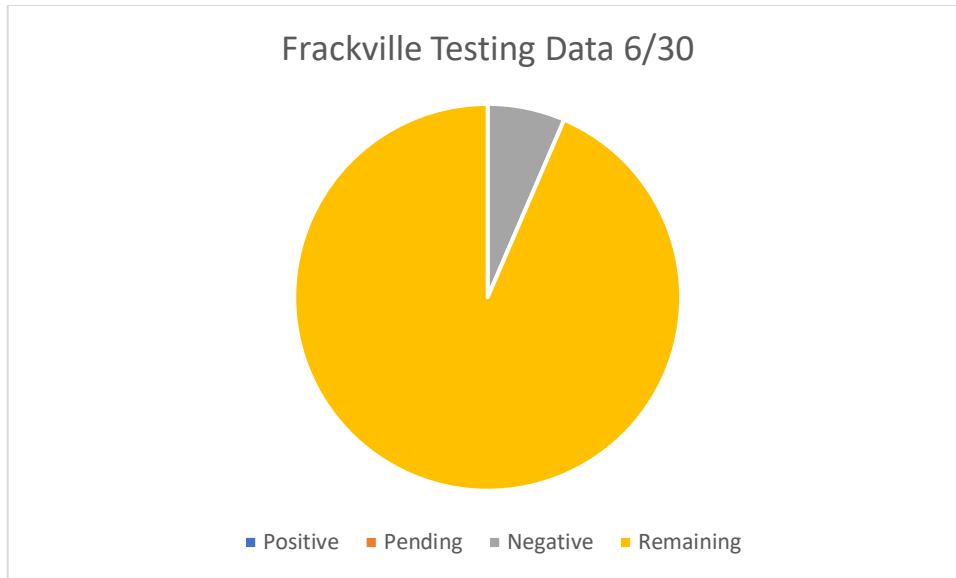


Figure 26: Frackville Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 79, Remaining: 1141.

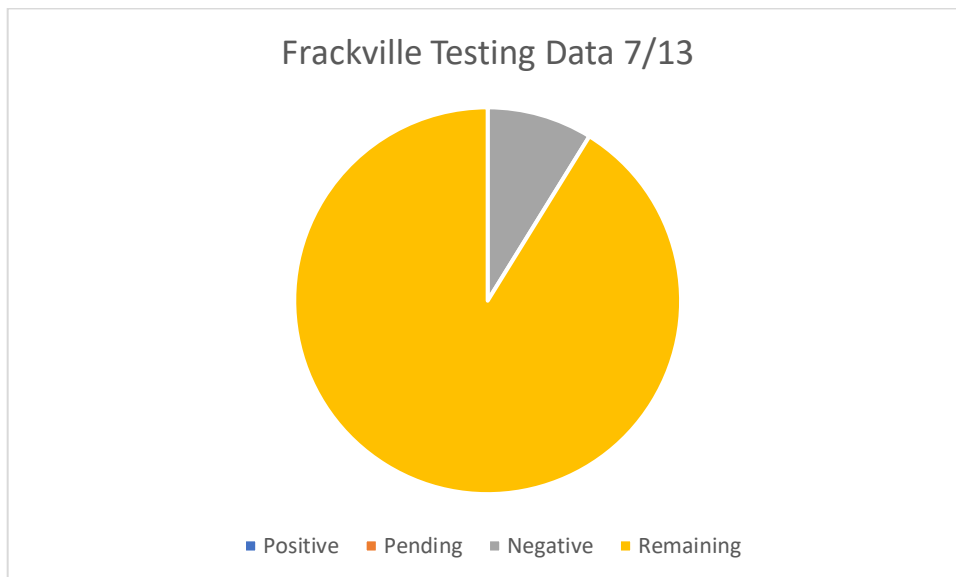


Figure 27: Frackville Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 106, Remaining: 1096.

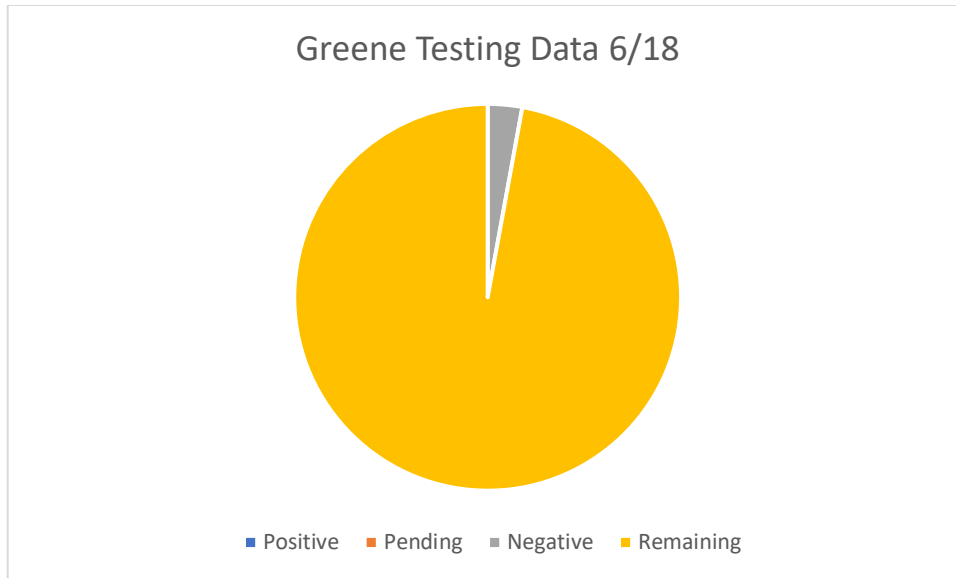


Figure 28: Greene Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 50, Remaining: 1688.

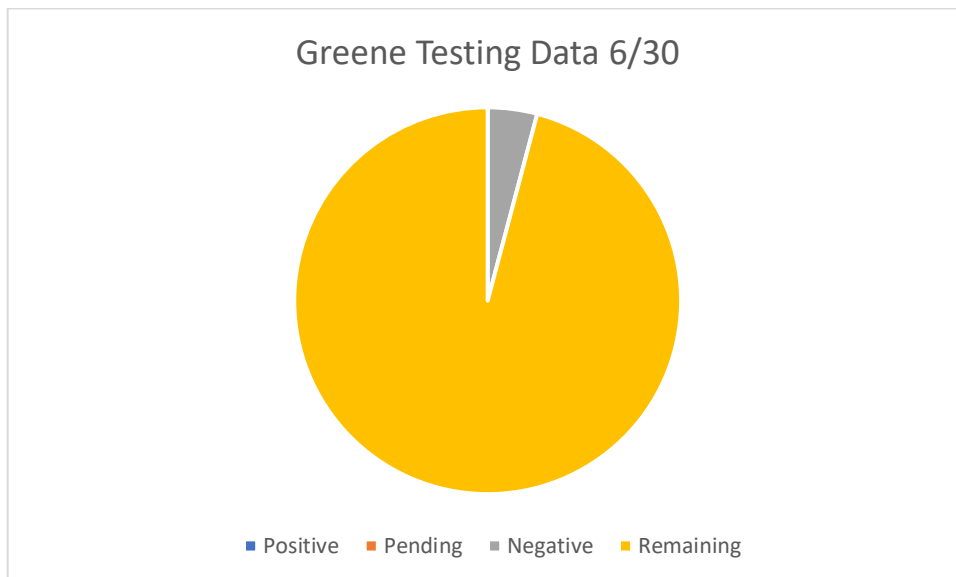


Figure 29: Greene Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 72, Remaining: 1671.

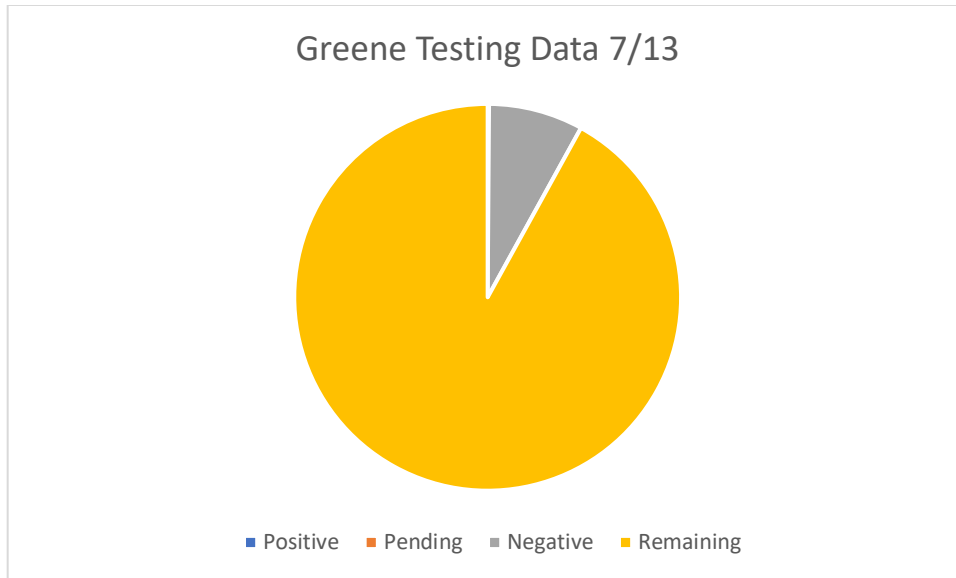


Figure 30: Greene Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 2, Pending: 0, Negative: 139, Remaining: 1617.

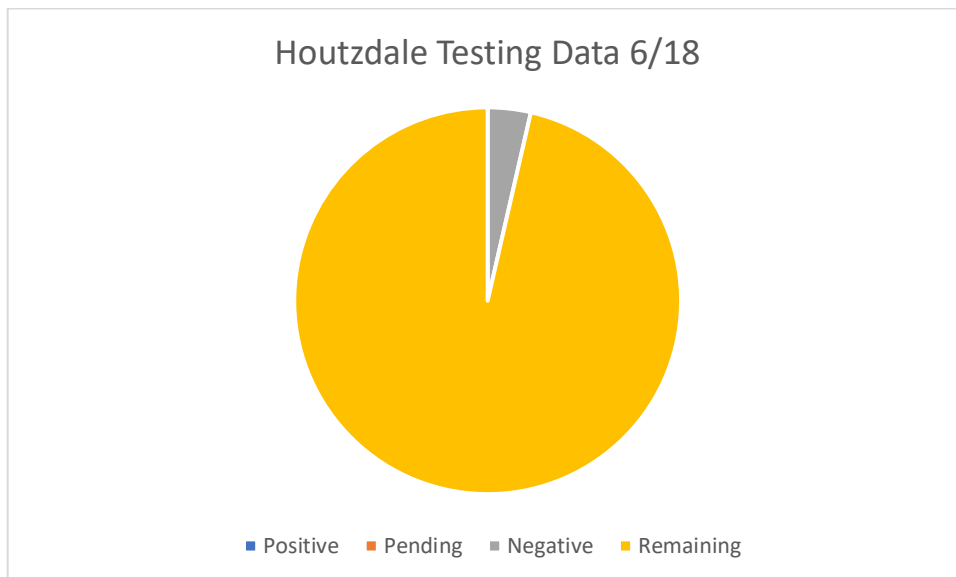


Figure 31: Houtzdale Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 87, Remaining: 2335.

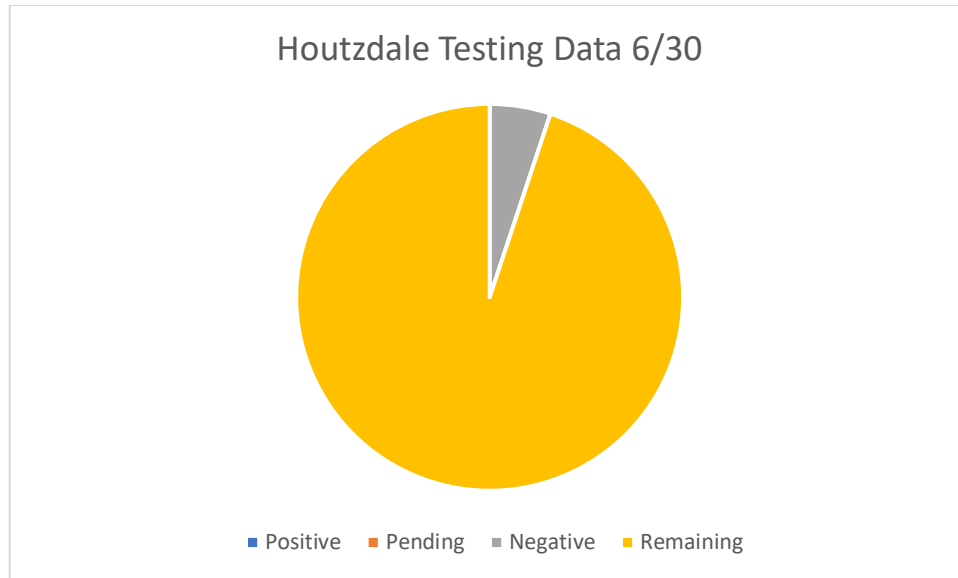


Figure 32: Houtzdale Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 125, Remaining: 2328.

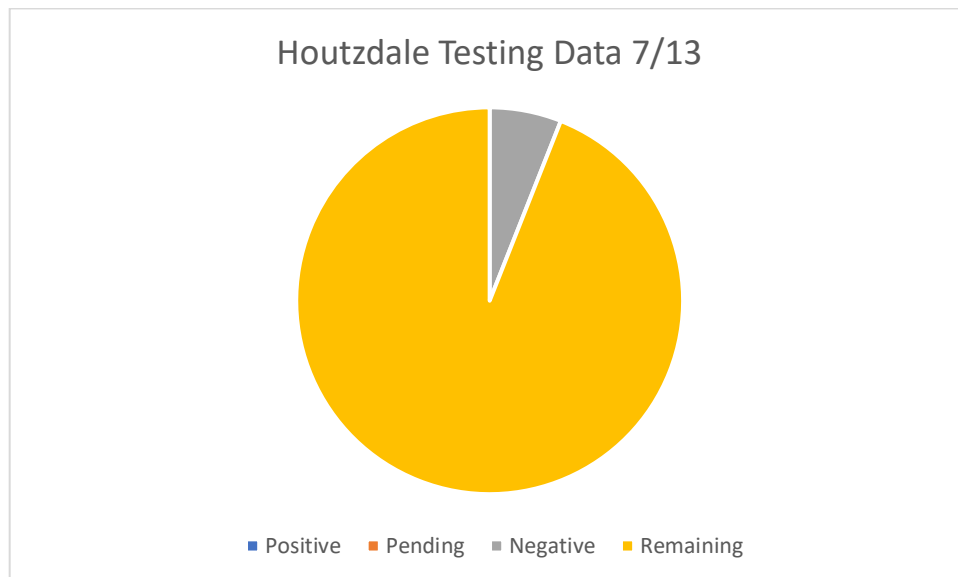


Figure 33: Houtzdale Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 147, Remaining: 2303.

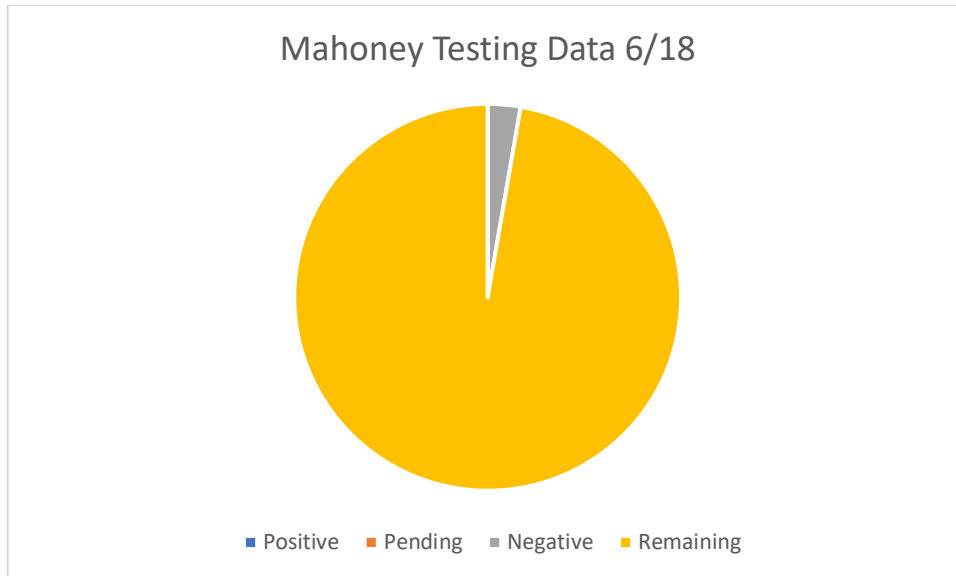


Figure 34: Mahoney Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 63, Remaining: 2239.

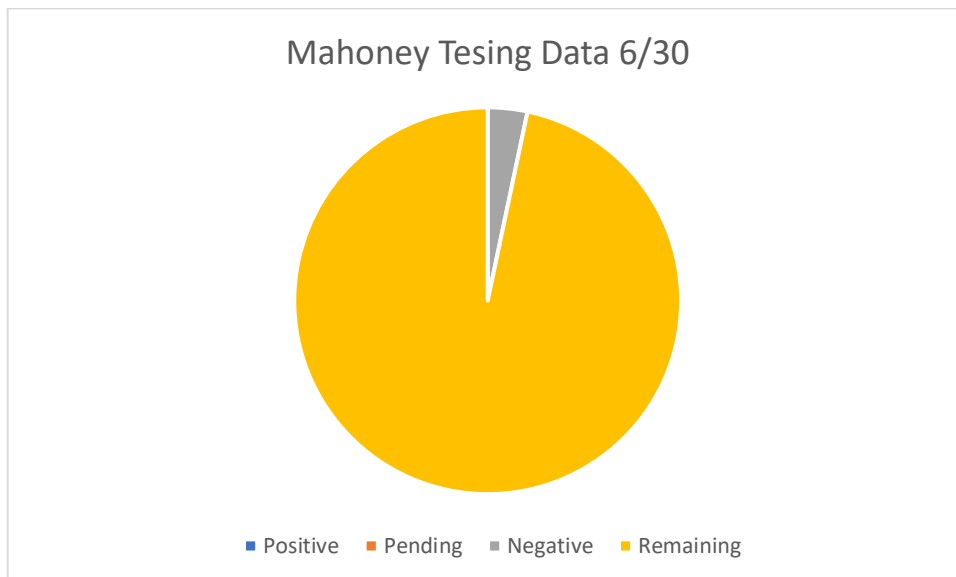


Figure 35: Mahoney Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 78, Remaining: 2278.

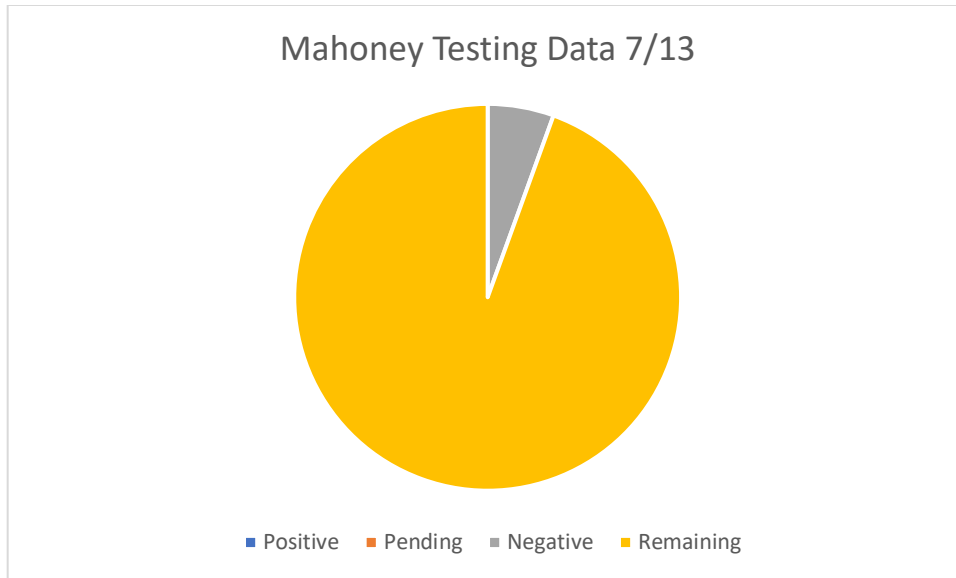


Figure 36: Mahoney Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 129, Remaining: 2202.

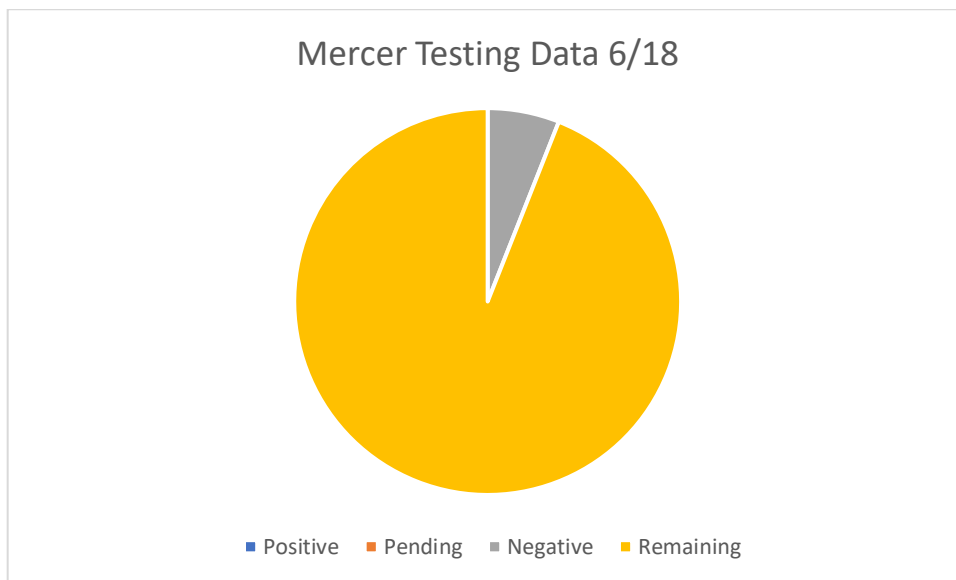


Figure 37: Mercer Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 78, Remaining: 1222.

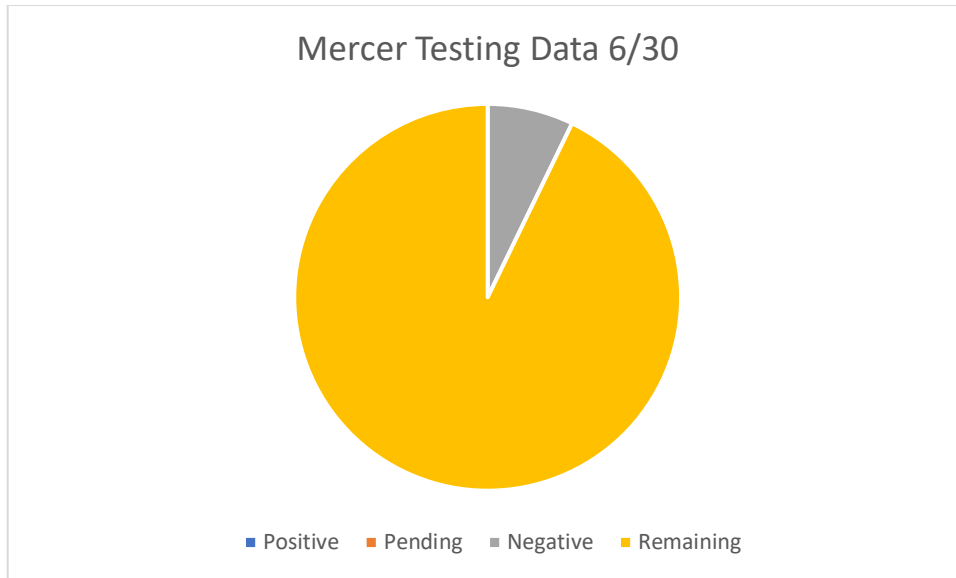


Figure 38: Mercer Testing Data June 30th. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 97, Remaining: 1251.

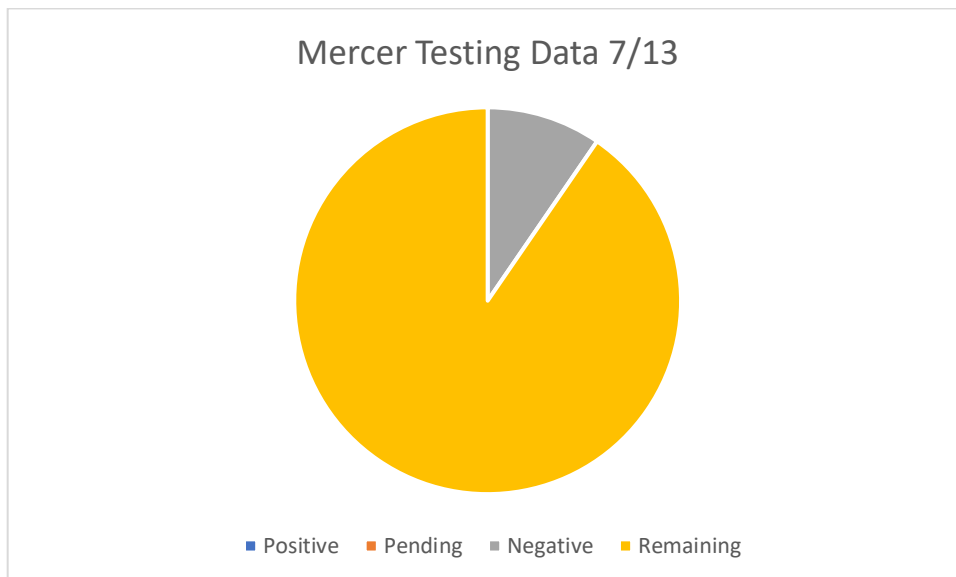


Figure 39: Mercer Testing Data July 13th. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 130, Remaining: 1227.

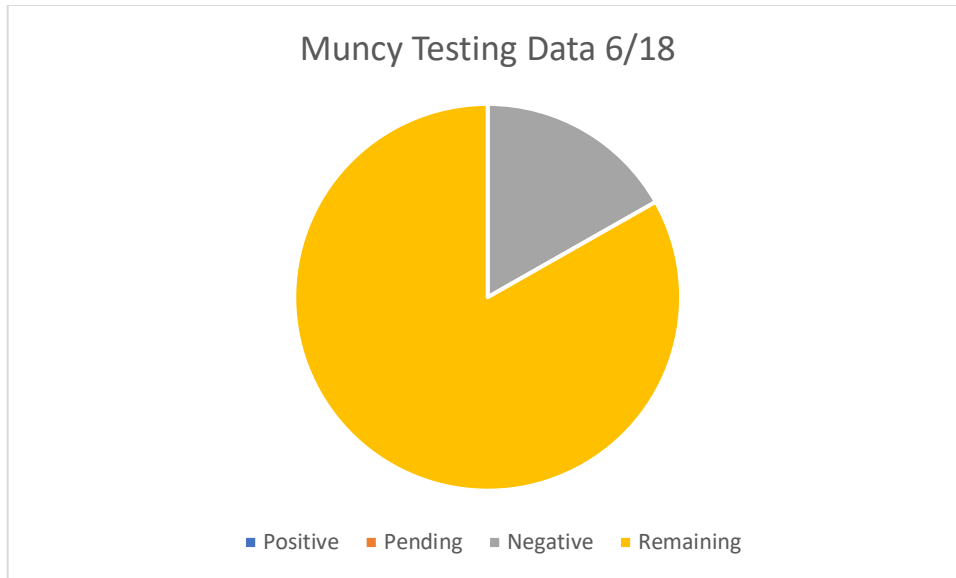


Figure 40: Muncy Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 196, Remaining: 972.

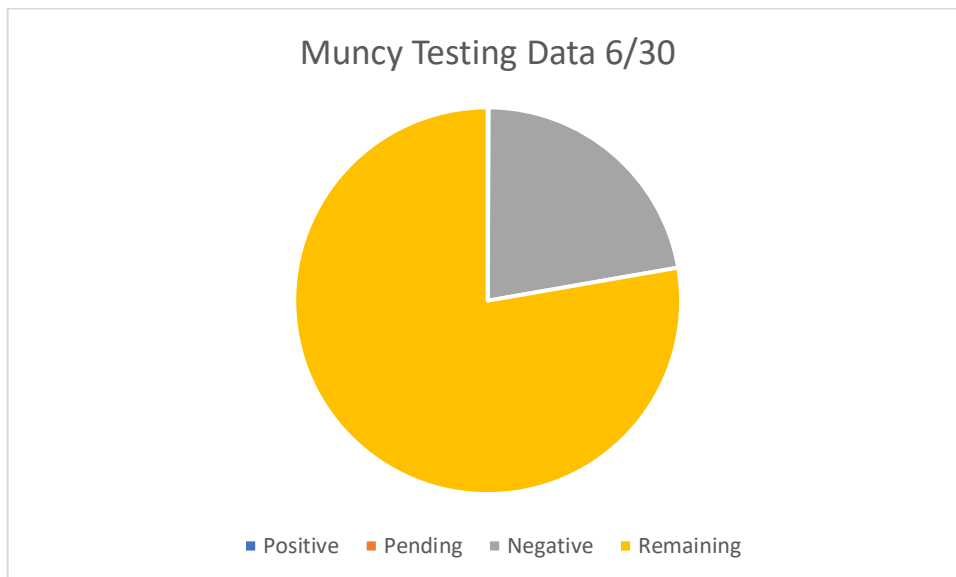


Figure 41: Muncy Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 1, Pending: 0, Negative: 251, Remaining: 880.



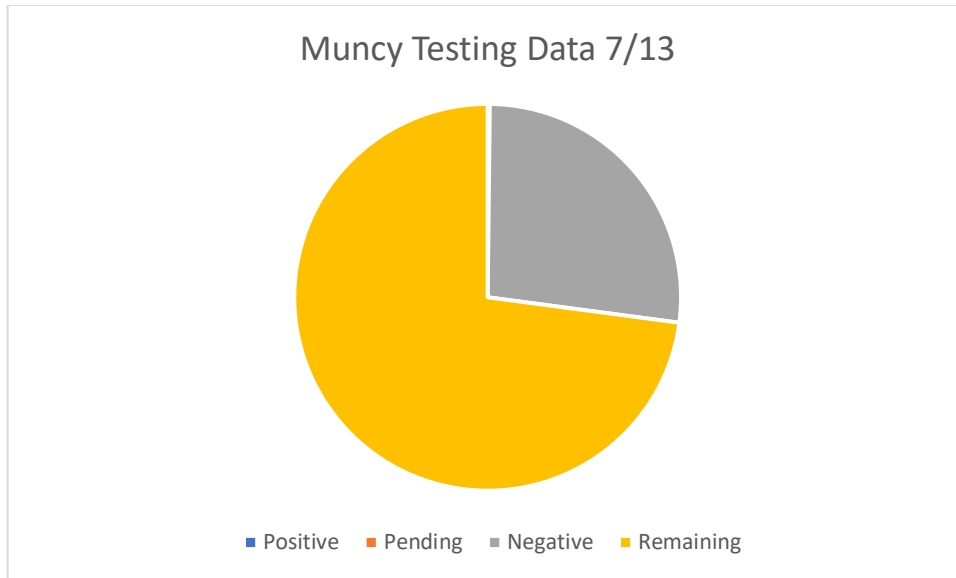


Figure 42: Muncy Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 2, Pending: 0, Negative: 304, Remaining: 823.

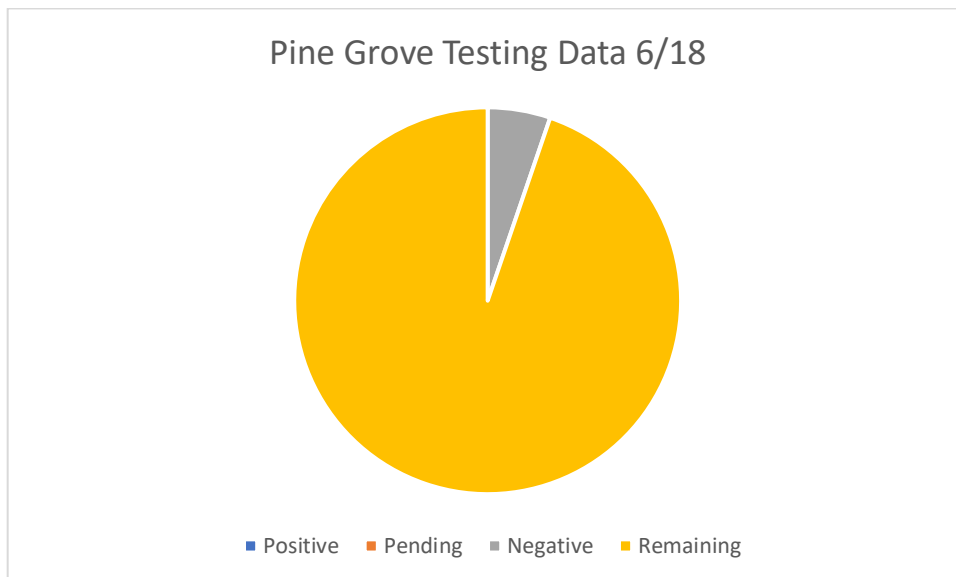


Figure 43: Pine Grove Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 53, Remaining: 958.

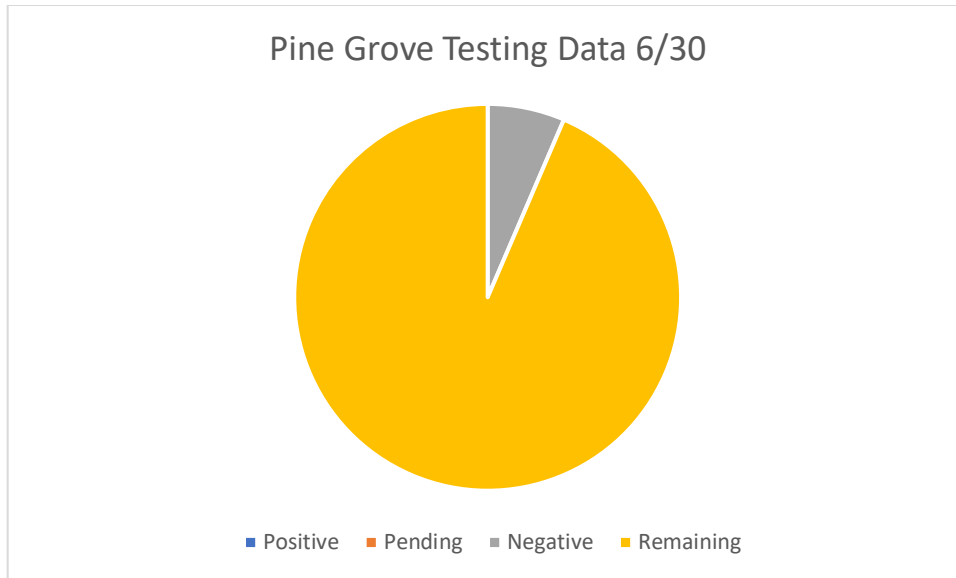


Figure 44: Pine Grove Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 67, Remaining: 971.

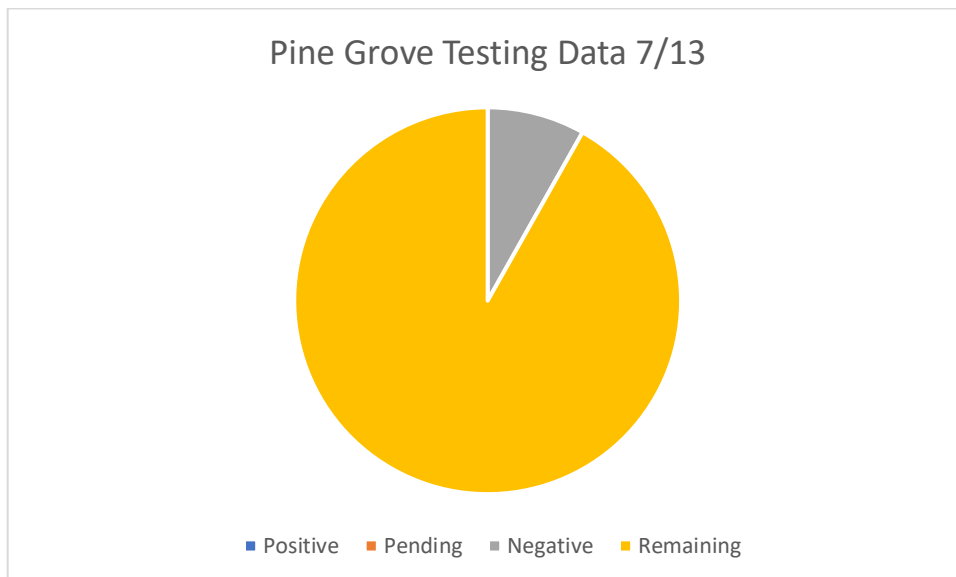


Figure 45: Pine Grove Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 87, Remaining: 978.

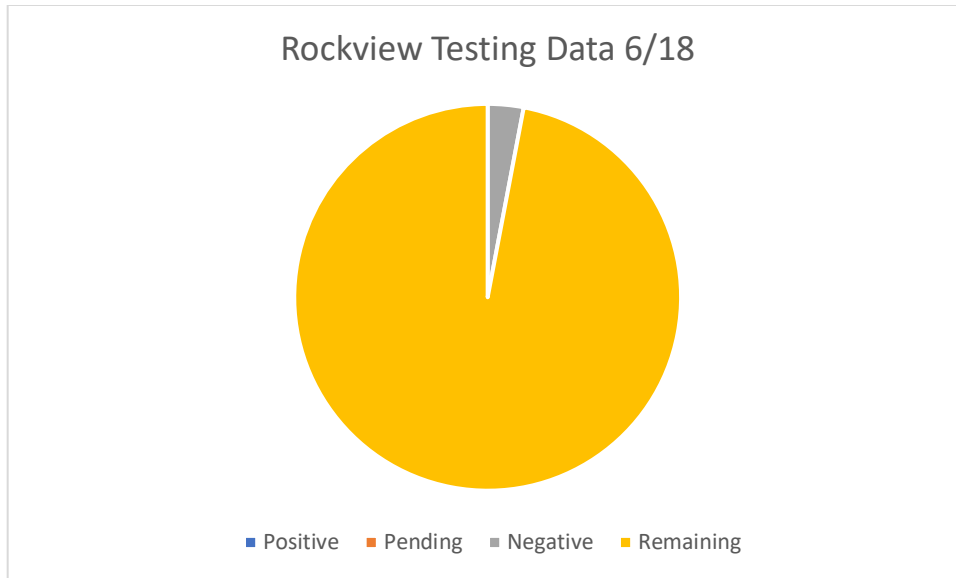


Figure 46: Rockview Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 60, Remaining: 1945.

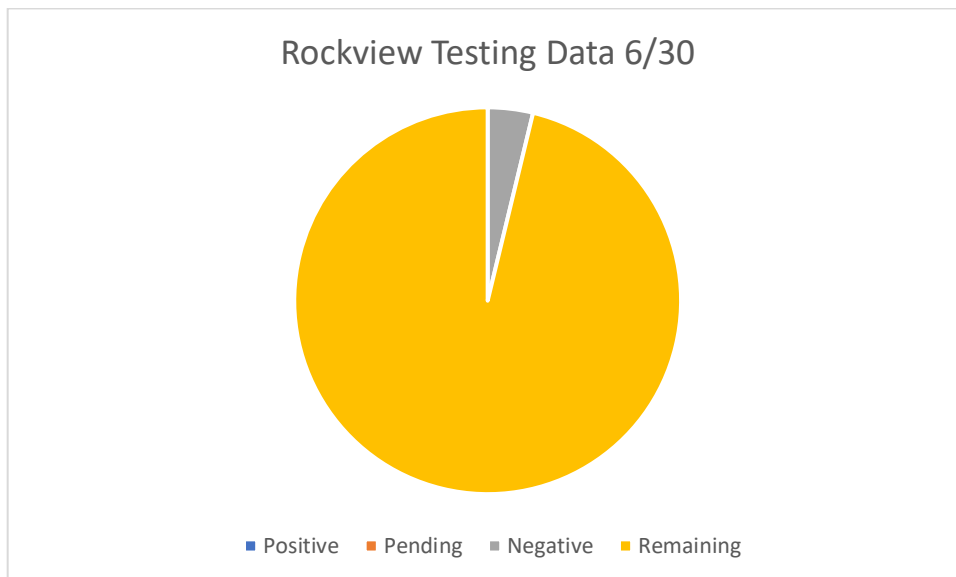


Figure 47: Rockview Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 75, Remaining: 1910.

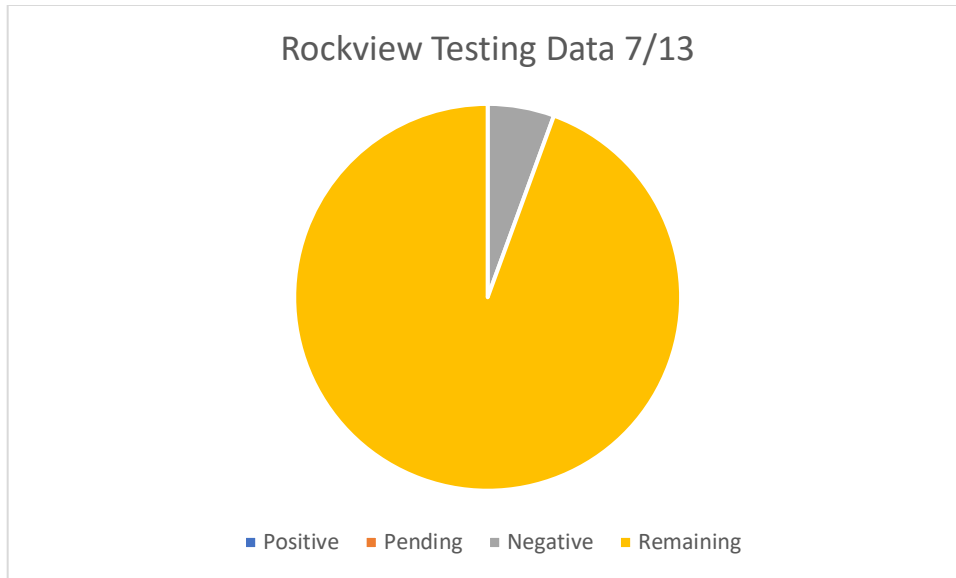


Figure 48: Rockview Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 110, Remaining: 1864.

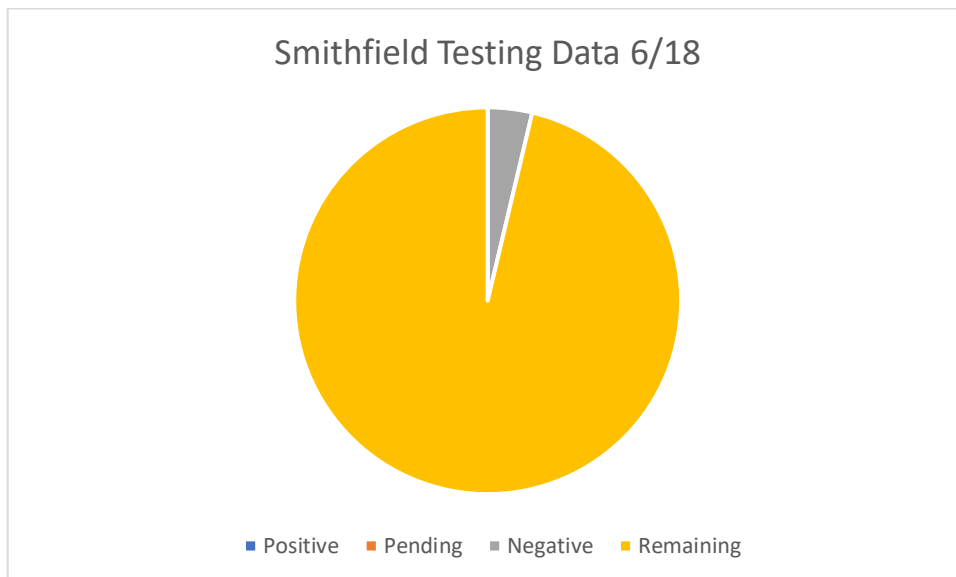


Figure 49: Smithfield Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 47, Remaining: 1220.

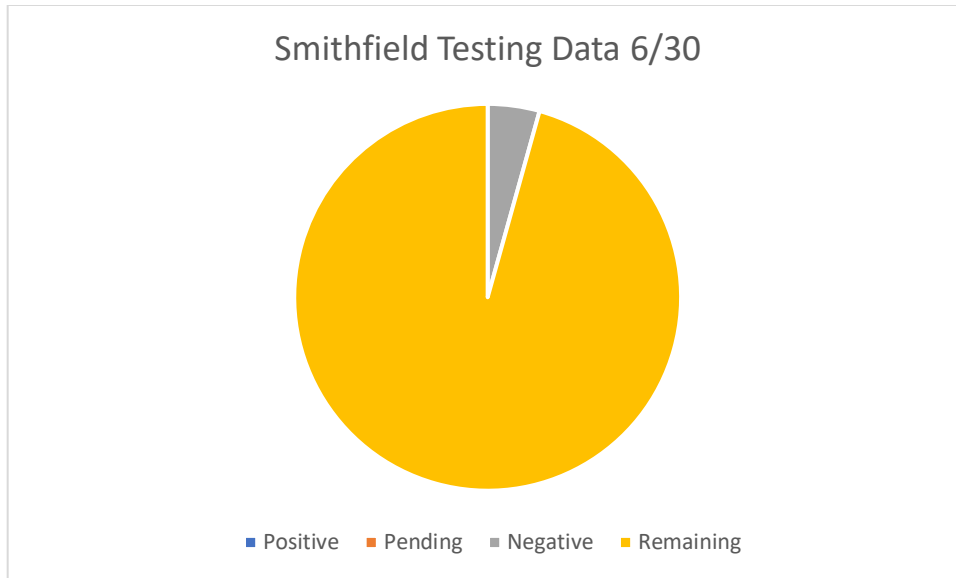


Figure 50: Smithfield Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 59, Remaining: 1304.

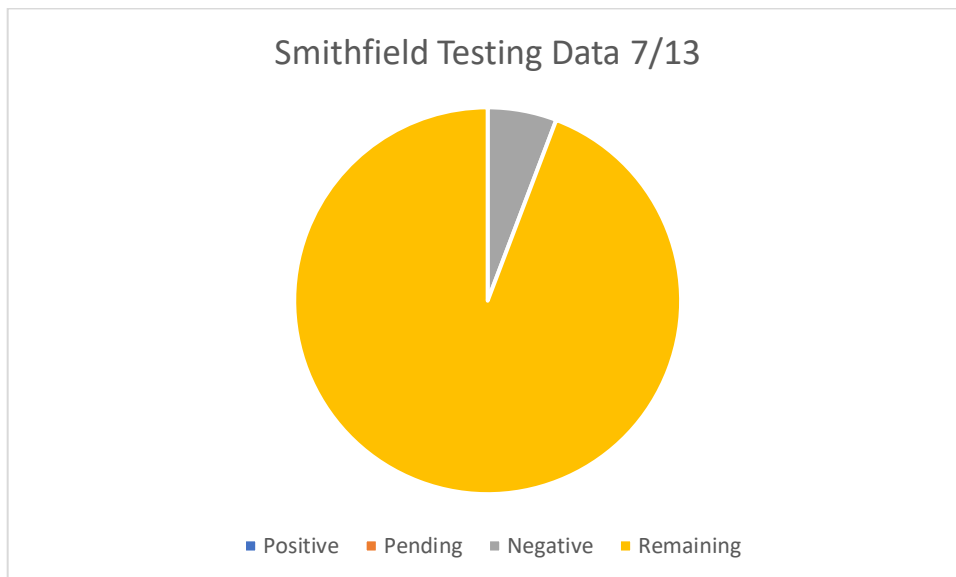


Figure 51: Smithfield Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 81, Remaining: 1322.

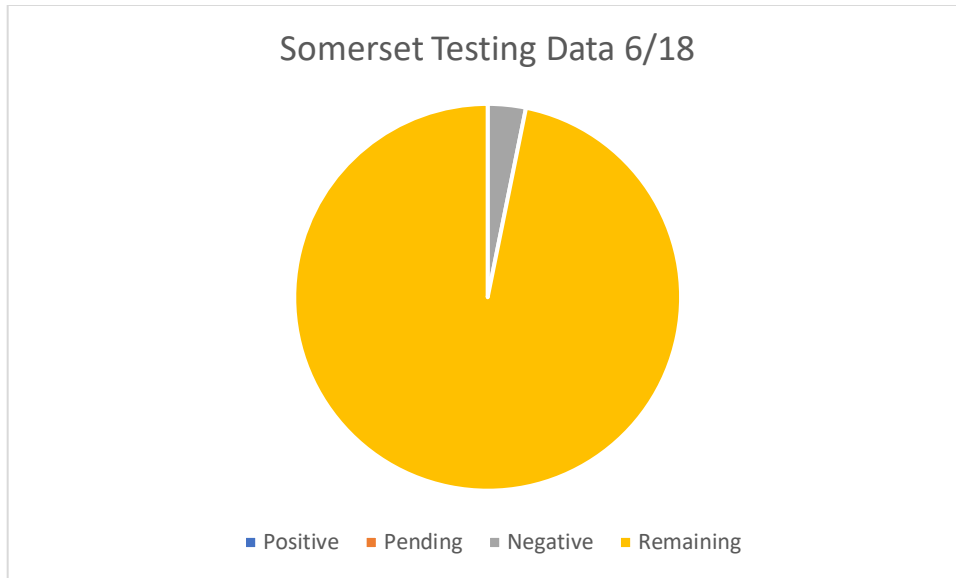


Figure 52: Somerset Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 72, Remaining: 2191.

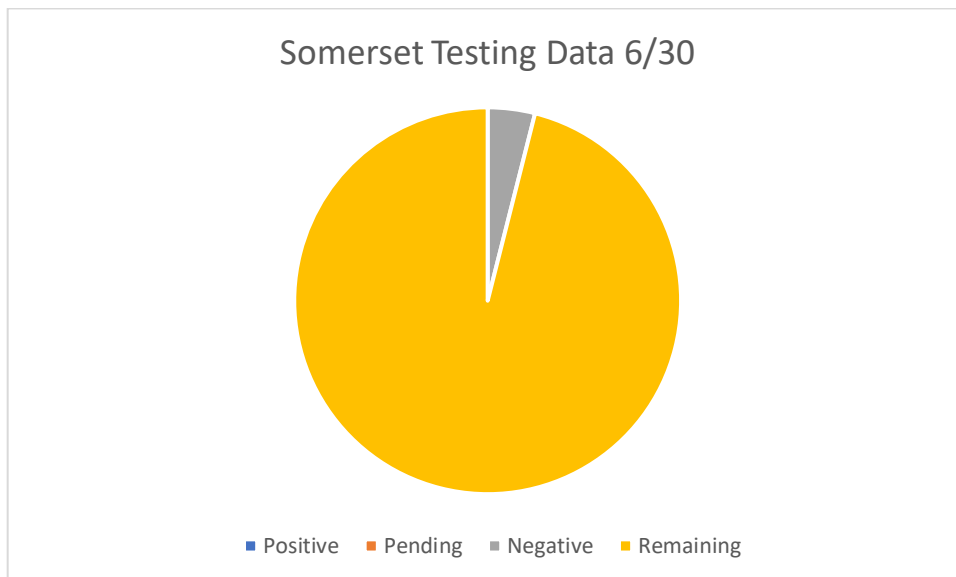


Figure 53: Somerset Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 91, Remaining: 2214.

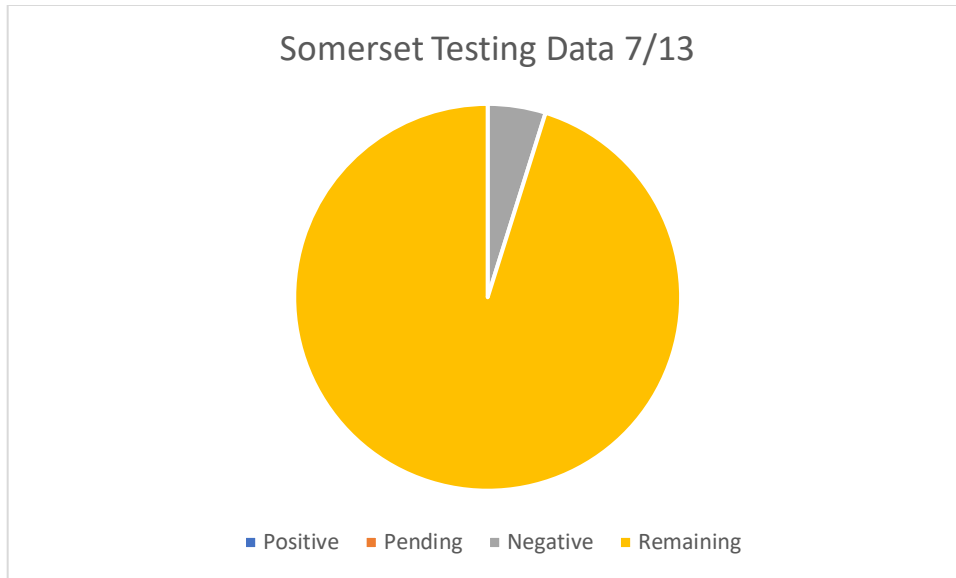


Figure 54: Somerset Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 0, Negative: 111, Remaining: 2181.

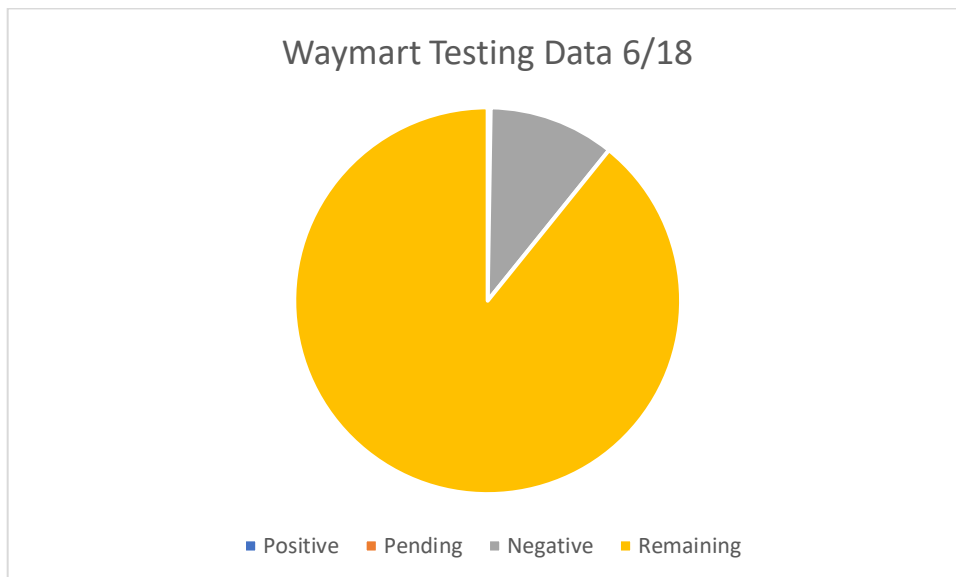


Figure 55: Waymart Testing Data June 18<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 3, Negative: 126, Remaining: 1066.

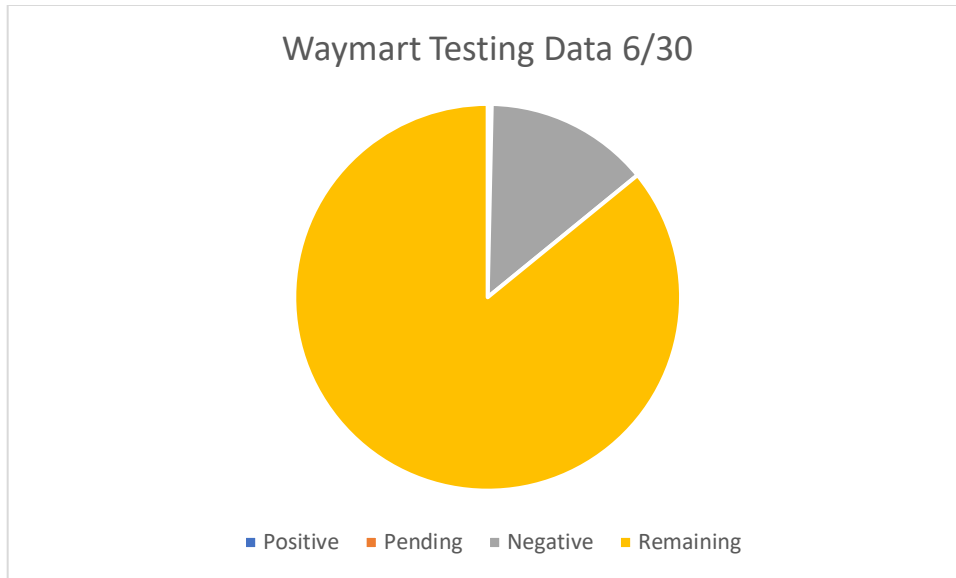


Figure 56: Waymart Testing Data June 30<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 4, Negative: 163, Remaining: 1016.

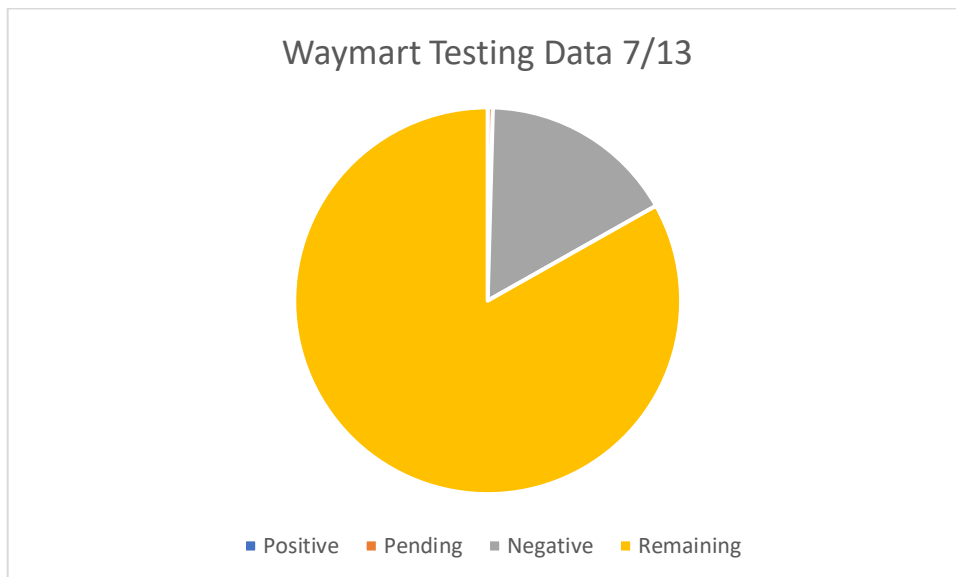


Figure 57: Waymart Testing Data July 13<sup>th</sup>. State Correctional Institution data was taken from Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. Pending data points are for those not yet classified as positive or negative. Remaining population are those inmates who have not been tested. Positive: 0, Pending: 5, Negative: 190, Remaining: 964.
